LEE POLICE DEPARTMENT REMINDER

Please Do Not park any vehicles upon any roadway in Town during a snowstorm as it impedes the Highway Department from doing their job. Also, please clear the snow from your vehicle before hitting the road!

Jessica's Law has been the law of NH for about fifteen (15) years now. It is a law that **requires the clearing of ice and snow off the top of a vehicle prior to driving it**. The basis of the law was a tragic accident that claimed the life of Jessica Smith in 1999.

265:79-b Negligent Driving. – Whoever upon any way drives a vehicle negligently or causes a vehicle to be driven negligently, as defined in RSA 626:2, II(d), or in a manner that endangers or is likely to endanger any person or property shall be guilty of a violation and shall be fined not less than \$250 nor more than \$500 for a first offense and not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000 for a second or subsequent offense.

The Supervisors of the Checklist will hold a session for the purpose of accepting applications for new voter registration, as well as requests for corrections to the checklist and/or change of political party affiliation on Saturday, January 29th from 10:00-10:30am at the Lee Public Library, 9 Mast Road.

Lee citizens may also register to vote at the Town Clerk's office at 249 Calef Highway, Lee, NH: Monday, Wednesday and Friday 8am - 4pm.

Applicants for voter registration who possess proof of identity, age (18 years of age), citizenship, and domicile should bring that proof when they come to register. Driver's license and passport are helpful. Qualified applicants who do not possess proof or who do not bring proof with them may still register if they sign an affidavit attesting to their qualifications for identity, age, citizenship, and/or domicile.

If you wish to vote at the Lee Deliberative Session on February 5th or at the Oyster River Cooperative School District Deliberative Session on February 8th, you must be registered by 1/29th.

The supervisors will hold a work session/meeting on Tuesday, February 1st at 9:00am at the Lee Town Offices to approve changes to the official checklist for the Town of Lee.

STUMPOLOGY PART 5 – DINING PLATFORMS

When a tree is taken down - by humans, beavers, or weather, the stump that remains continues to benefit and enrich the surrounding forest, often for many decades. Nothing is wasted in nature, and until the process of decomposition deconstructs it entirely, a stump is useful to woodland denizens in a number of ways. One of the most common uses is as a dining platform.

Look at the surface of just about any stump and you'll find evidence of a meal, usually the inedible bits left behind by a feeding chipmunk or squirrel. Like most rodents, squirrels and chipmunks are foragers - their days are spent in a constant search for, and gathering of, cones, nuts, fruits, invertebrates and fungi. Much of what is foraged is set aside for winter in large stashes called larder hoards. Some foods, however, are scatter-hoarded - small stockpiles left here and there within the animal's territory for use throughout the season. Small, warm-blooded animals like squirrels and chipmunks have high metabolisms, so amid all that hunting and gathering snack breaks are necessary.

When you're on just about every predator's menu, foraging on the ground is a dangerous endeavor, and squirrels and chipmunks are constantly on guard. Each animal has a good inner map of nearby

escape routes such as trees, burrow holes and stone walls. When danger threatens, foraging is immediately abandoned for a mad dash to a safe haven. Snack breaks are a bit more problematic. Gnawing open a tough nut or dismantling a cone is a relatively noisy operation, one which requires some focus on the part of the animal, leaving it vulnerable to stealthy attacks from predators on the ground and in the air. That's where a stump comes in handy.

Carrying your snack to a stump and eating it there is worth the extra time and effort because it provides an elevated and panoramic view of the surrounding area. Stump-dining raises a six-inch tall chipmunk by a foot or more above ground level and makes it much more difficult for a fox,



weasel or hawk to approach unobserved. For this reason, many of the stumps within a chipmunk or squirrel's territory are used as snacking platforms or even as locations of scatter hoards.

All manner of foods are carried to these dining platforms - cones of pines and hemlocks, acorns, hickory nuts, maple samaras, grubs, berries and fungi. The pine stump pictured to the left shows the remnants of a big acorn feed, but as the close-up shows, there's also the remains of a mushroom stem in the mix. Another stump below shows the woody stems of white pine cones with all the bract scales removed - squirrels, particularly red squirrels, peel each bract off the cone stem to get at the naked seeds hidden inside. Hemlock cones are another favorite of red squirrels and the below photograph shows yet another stump with three of a hemlock's much smaller cone stems running diagonally from the photo's upper left down to the

lower right. These petite cone stems are surrounded by bract scales of both white pine and hemlock cones.

Inevitably, when great numbers of cones are dismantled on a favorite dining stump, a few seeds will fall unnoticed onto the stump's surface. As is evident from the photograph, stumps have many crevices into which seeds can disappear. We'll come back to these in a later article, but keep this in mind as your woodland walks bring you past stumps. What remnants of meals can you identify? Cone seeds are small, but a close examination will often reveal an overlooked seed or two. Are some stumps "acorn platforms" and others "cone platforms"? Compare what you see on the stump with the tree species growing nearby. Children are especially enchanted by the idea of dining stumps, and a walk devoted to finding these natural dining platforms and identifying what was for dinner can transform a walk in the woods into a treasure hunt.

OYSTER RIVER COOPERATIVE SCHOOL DISTRICT NEWS – 1-19-2022

The Oyster River School District wants to hear from residents of Durham, Lee, and Madbury about how the school district communicates with residents. Separate surveys were conducted with parents and staff; this survey is focused on residents and taxpayers who do not have students in school. The School District updated procedures and recommendations regarding responding to positive COVID test results, COVID exposure, and testing utilizing the latest guidance and resources from the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services. This detailed update was emailed to parents on January 20 and is posted online.

ORCSD collaborated with MacGregor Memorial EMS to offer COVID-19 vaccination boosters to students aged 12 and up with parent permission on January 14th. 312 boosters were administered. The opening of the new Oyster River Middle School building is just over a month away. The current ORMS building, parts of which date to 1935, will host an open house and be open for public visits on Friday, February 11th, 4:00-6:00 pm and Saturday, February 12th, 10:00am-noon. Masks are required for these events. The current ORMS building will be removed starting in March.

The school board adopted the calendar for 2022-2023 school year. August 31, 2022 will be the 1st day of school. New Year's recess will be December 26, 2022 - January 2, 2023. Winter vacation is February 20-24, 2023, and Spring recess is April 24-28, 2023. If there are no snow days, the last day of school will be June 16, 2023.

Grief, Healing, and Resilience: A Structured Program of Support for Adults Who Have Lost Children/Grandchildren, Nieces/Nephews, Spouses/Partners, or Siblings

Mondays; April 4, 11th, 18th and 25th 5-6:30pm Chapel, Community Church of Durham, NH

At some point, most humans suffer grief, often defined as the process by which someone experiences loss. But losing a child/grandchild, niece/nephew, spouse/partner, or a sibling is an especially devastating form of seismic trauma. While grieving is very specific—based on the individual griever, the nature of the loss, and the relationship with the one who has been lost—there are many common elements to the journey. These include an emotional roller coaster at times triggered by passing comments such as "Oh, you'll get over it" or "You'll have another child," or "Don't be in denial," or "She's in a better place." This program of four 90-minute meetings is NOT clinical therapy, but it is designed to offer information and some tools for engaging with grief and healing. While spiritual in orientation, the program is non-sectarian and non-denominational. Discussion is most welcome, but no one need participate if not comfortable doing so.

Facilitator: Steve Hardy earned a graduate-level Grief Support Specialist Certificate from the University of Wisconsin in 2017. More important, he has personal experience in grief—shared with his wife Donna—through the loss of two sons. He retired in 2014 as Professor of Kinesiology and Affiliate Professor of History at the University of New Hampshire, where he won awards for teaching excellence. This is the third time he has offered the structured program. Since 2018, he has also facilitated informal grief support groups. And he has written blogs on resilience at: https://onesummit.org/what-we-do/profiles-in-resilience/

Enrollment: This program is for grieving adults who have lost a child/grandchild, niece/nephew, spouse/partner, or a sibling. BYO writing material— tablet (paper or digital), pencil, pen.
