2021 TOWN OF LEE TAX RATE SET AT \$21.77

FALL COLOR-CHANGE IN NORTHERN PITCHER PLANTS By Catherine Fisher

The Lee Hill Bog is a unique and beautiful habitat at any time of year, but it becomes truly glamorous in autumn, when the highbush blueberries turn red, providing a bright contrast to the dark green foliage of the black spruce growing among them. Brightening the bog from below, sphagnum moss is ubiquitous, carpeting the bog in brilliant autumnal tones of green, ochre, and garnet.

Nestled beneath the blueberry bushes and black spruce are clumps of northern pitcher plants. Though many of these plants do not undergo a color change in the fall, some of them do, and they do so because of a deficiency of phosphorus.

Bogs are nutrient-poor environments and plants that live here must have strategies for coping with this lack of nourishment. In the case of the pitcher plant, nutrients are gleaned by capturing and digesting insects. With bright green leaves that are modified to form its eponymous shape, pitcher plants capture rainwater. Their deep red veins, many of which are lined with floral nectaries, attract insects, and secretions along the lip of the pitcher make it a very slippery place. Ants, small flying insects, and even newly metamorphosed spotted salamanders perch on the lip of the pitcher and sometimes fall in. Stiff, downward-facing hairs line the mouth and interior of the plant make it difficult for the plant's prey to climb out, and an unlucky few drown. Their bodies sink down into the bottom of the pitcher, where its enzymes digest them, absorbing the nutrients necessary for the pitcher plant to survive.



Many pitcher plants retain their bright green pigment throughout the fall and winter. However, as the days shorten, some pitchers begin to lose their green pigment, and the burgundy of their veins often seems to bleed into the surrounding leaf structure, suffusing the entire plant. Studies have shown that this color change occurs in pitchers that did not receive enough phosphorus during the growing season. Phosphorus, a nutrient critical for the production of chlorophyll, is virtually nonexistent in the bog, and it is one of the nutrients pitcher plants obtain through the insects they capture. Pitchers that slowly turn deep burgundy in the fall are plants that weren't able to capture enough insects during the growing season. The color difference in the two pitchers in the photograph is likely due to differences in the number of

insects each was able to catch. The pitcher on the left is still bright green and likely had an ample number of captures. The pitcher on the right appears not to have been as fortunate, and is losing its chlorophyll. Without the phosphorus necessary to produce chlorophyll, the green pigment in their leaves breaks down, revealing the underlying red pigments; come winter, all the green will be gone, and the plant will be almost entirely burgundy-colored.

TRAIL RELOCATIONS IN THE TOWN FOREST

If you've hiked the trails in the Town Forest, you may have noticed sections that are wet or steep or eroded. The Lee Trails Committee is working on relocating 3 sections to improve trail conditions and protect the Town Forest resource. The goal is to make all town trails safe, accessible, and enjoyable for users. The trail relocations will help with erosion control, make certain sections safer, and help with year round access. Previous work crews have accomplished a lot and had a great time.

The Lee Trails Committee will be hosting 1 more trail work day at the Lee Town Forest:

REMINDER THAT 10-DIGIT DIALING STARTS OCTOBER 24, 2021

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has adopted 988 as a new three-digit number to be used nationwide to reach the National Suicide Prevention and Mental Health Crisis Lifeline. In order for 988 to work in your area code, **10-digit local dialing will be required starting October 24, 2021.** If your area code is in New Hampshire, Vermont, or in some areas of New York listed below, you will need to change how you dial local calls.

What will be the new dialing procedure?

To complete all local calls, you will now need to dial **area code + telephone number**. This applies to all calls within your area code that are currently dialed with seven digits.

Who will be affected?

Anyone with a telephone number in the following areas will need to adopt using this mandatory change from 7-digit local dialing to 10-digit local dialing:

- All of New Hampshire (603 area code)
- All of Vermont (802 area code)
- The New York area codes of 516, 607, 716, 845, and 914.

When will the change begin?

Beginning October 24, 2021, 10-digit dialing (area code + telephone number) will be mandatory for all local calls. Beginning on this date, local calls dialed with only 7-digits will not be completed. Instead the caller will hear a recording informing them that their call cannot be completed as dialed. The caller must hang up and dial using all 10 digits (area code + 7-digit number).

Beginning **July 16, 2022**, dialing "988" will route your call to the National Suicide Prevention and Mental Health Crisis Lifeline.

What will you need to do?

In addition to changing the way you dial local calls, all services, automatic dialing equipment, or other types of equipment that are programmed to complete calls to 7-digit local numbers will need to be reprogrammed to complete calls to 10-digit numbers. Some examples are life safety systems or medical monitoring devices, PBXs, fax machines, Internet dial-up numbers, fire or burglar alarm and security systems or gates, speed dialers, mobile or other wireless phone contact lists, call forwarding settings, voicemail services and other similar functions. Be sure to check your website, personal and business stationery, advertising materials, personal and business checks, contact information, your personal or pet ID tags, and other such items to ensure the area code is included.

What will remain the same?

- Your telephone number, including current area code, will not change.
- The price of a call, coverage area, or other rates and services will not change.
- What is a local call now will remain a local call regardless of the number of digits dialed.
- You will continue to dial 1+ area code + telephone number for all long distance calls.
- You can still dial just three digits to reach 711 (relay services) and 911 (emergency services).
- Any 211, 311, 411, 511, 611, or 811 services available in your community will still be reached by dialing their three-digit codes.
- The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline can still be reached by dialing 1-800-273-TALK (8255) until the new 3-digit number is active on July 16, 2022.
