### 2021 TOWN OF LEE TAX RATE SET AT \$21.77

#### Due date is Friday, December 3, 2021

The 2021 tax rate was set by the Select Board at their meeting on October 18<sup>th</sup>. The Board applied \$250,000 from the unassigned fund balance to reduce the Town tax rate by an additional \$0.34 over the preliminary rate. Overall, the tax rate decreased by \$10.09 or 31.67%.



Greetings, fellow recyclers! The Sustainability Committee has a couple of announcements this week. First, you've no doubt noticed some changes at the Transfer Station. The obvious change is that the divided bin (office paper and magazines) has been recombined back to mixed paper. A less obvious change is the financial information that is posted at the bins to let us know how much we earn (or pay) to recycle our recyclables. The pandemic has raised the demand for recycled material across the board and the paper market is especially hot. Now more than ever, it pays to recycle! The second announcement is that we've updated the One Bin electronic book to reflect these changes and posted it on the Sustainability Committee's page on the town's website in place of the old version – <a href="https://www.leenh.org/sustainability-committee">https://www.leenh.org/sustainability-committee</a> (left side, One Bin at a Time button). We hope it will serve as an ongoing resource for the community and we will continue to keep it up to date as things change.





The Lee Heritage Commission has created a series of historic marker plaques that are being awarded to the owners of historic properties in Lee who have successfully applied for New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places designation. The wording on each plaque states, *"This Property is Placed on the State Register of Historic Places by the New Hampshire State Register of Historic Places"*.

Every time we share a photo of a historic property plaque presentation, we will also try to share some of the history of that property – and the families and/or organizations that have owned it. On October 30, 2021, the Heritage Commission had the honor of presenting the Lee Library trustees with a plaque that acknowledges the historic importance of the Lee Library to the State of New Hampshire and the Town of Lee.

#### Lee Library History:

The front part of the Lee Library started out as the Center School in Lee. It was built in 1897 on the Lee Hook Road and was moved to its current location in 1962. The structure has been added onto three times over the years to accommodate the increase use and services the library provides to the citizens of Lee. The Lee Library was placed on the New Hampshire Register of Historic Places on January 25, 2021.

# TURKEY TAILS, PART 2: TRUE TURKEY TAILS

Turkey tails, *Trametes versicolor* are the snowflakes of the mushroom world - no two clusters of these fruiting bodies are alike, and every woodland seems to have its own native strain or ecotype. Though they all resemble the fanned tail of a turkey, the bands of color in each mushroom cluster differ in width and color. They are lovely organisms. Coming across the one pictured here, I was reminded of the lacy, swirling skirts of flamenco dancers.



With the possible exception of the oyster mushroom, turkey tail may be the most widely distributed fungus on the planet. It is found from boreal forests to tropical forests and every other forest in between. Like the false turkey tail discussed last week, it is a saprophyte, breaking down lignins in tree cells and releasing essential nutrients into the surrounding soil. Turkey tails are polypore mushrooms and have pores, or tubes, rather than gills to develop and then release their spores. Polypores form shelves or brackets on their wood substrates, and often, in the case of turkey tail, these brackets form rosettes. When fresh, the mushroom is flexible and leathery with a soft nap on its upper surface. Turn a turkey tail mushroom upside down, and you'll find that it is white and full of pores. You can find turkey tails growing on hardwood snags, logs, stumps and branches, though they will also colonize dead, coniferous wood.

Turkey tail has been used by native cultures in Asia, the Americas and Europe for hundreds, if not thousands, of years. Native American herbalists used it for treating pulmonary illnesses. In traditional Chinese medicine the fungus is called *yun zhi*, meaning "cloud mushroom", and has long been used to treat diseases of both lung and spleen. The pharmacological value of turkey tail has been borne out in recent decades by research indicating that this species has immune-boosting as well as cancer-fighting properties. Studies have shown it to be of significant benefit when combined with traditional treatments for certain cancers.

Beyond its medical value, turkey tail has long been valued for its beauty. Cultures the world over have incorporated these mushrooms into art and decorative works. The fruiting bodies can be used to create blue and green dye for paper and fabrics; its leathery fans have been used by artists in assemblages and by artisans to create earrings, necklaces, and to decorate clothing.

*Trametes versicolor* is a truly versatile fungus. Should you come across a patch, take a moment to appreciate a fungus that has had a very long association with humans the world over.

Comments: Our home was built in 1985 and the construction left no shade trees for the south side of the house. I transplanted two small yellow maples (@ 7 ft. each) in 1995 and they grew to become very nice shade trees. In the spring of 2020, a strong thunderstorm twisted off the whole side of one of the trees. In the fall of that year we had Jon Roy take down the rest of the tree. Since our vegetable garden is in that spot, it is unlikely that we will replace the tree that was lost; however, we still have the other one.


## Poor Houses and Town Farms with Stephen Taylor



#### Wednesday December 1, 2021 at 7PM via Zoom

From its earliest settlements NH has struggled with issues surrounding the treatment of its poor. The early Northeastern colonies followed the lead of England's 1601 Poor Law, which imposed compulsory taxes for maintenance of the poor but made no distinction between the "vagrant, vicious poor" and the helpless, and honest poor. This confusion persisted for generations and led

directly to establishment in most of the state's towns of alms houses and poor farms and, later, county institutions which would collectively come to form a dark chapter in New Hampshire history. Steve Taylor will examine how paupers were treated in these facilities and how reformers eventually succeeded in closing them down. <u>REGISTER HERE</u>. ### **OYSTER RIVER COOPERATIVE SCHOOL DISTRICT NEWS – 11-17-2021**

The Oyster River School District recognized 8 school bus drivers who have served students for 5, 15, 30, and 40-year milestones with a combined 205 years of service. We celebrate Barb Evans, Janet Deon, and Lisa Huppe for 30 years of service each, and Marion Henry for a remarkable 40-year milestone! A sincere Thank You and Congratulations for your dedication!

A COVID-19 vaccination clinic for Oyster River and Barrington residents aged 5-11 will be offered Saturday, November 20 in the ORHS gym from 8:00am to 4:00pm. Details have been emailed to parents. The 2nd vaccination dose will be offered December 11. Weekly COVID-19 surveillance testing in Oyster River schools continues, with over 500 weekly participants.

The new Oyster River Middle School building will open to students on February 28, 2022. In order to accommodate the move, the middle school staff will utilize February 16, 17, and 18, 2022 as professional development days. There will be no school for middle school students on February 16-18. This is the last three school days before February school vacation. ORHS, Mast Way, and Moharimet will have school as normal on these days.

Congratulations to Oyster River High School Unified Soccer team for winning the state championship!

The School Board will hold a public hearing on December 1, 2021 regarding proposed changes to ORCSD policy BHE regarding school board use of email. The proposed revision will be posted with the backup materials for the December 1 meeting by November 26.

The New Hampshire Department of Education released projected 2022-2023 state education grant funding information. The School Board considered this input along with the budget work-in-progress at the November 17 school board meeting and a dedicated November 18 school board workshop meeting. No action will be taken before the December 1 regular meeting. After the School Board adopts a proposed budget, a budget hearing will be held in January, Deliberative Session in February, and final vote by Oyster River citizens in March.
