Following live music from the ORCSD Jazz Band at the Tree Lighting, everyone walks over to the Grange to hear more from these talented young musicians.





#### **SNOW CASTING NOTICE**

The Town has been experiencing more and more issues with snow casting. The road crews have been working very hard to keep our roads clear only to have some residents plow, snow blow or shovel snow back onto the roads. The Town has posted this numerous times on Facebook and in the E-Crier along with issuing warnings but to no avail! The Police Department will be issuing fines from this point forward. Please see the Snow Casting Ordinance below:

#### SNOW CASTING ORDINANCE

The following ordinance is adopted by the Board of Selectmen pursuant to authority granted under RSA 31:39.

- 1. Be it hereby ordained that NO PERSON shall throw or allow to be thrown, cast, placed or deposited any snow or ice into or upon the plowed portion of any street, sidewalk or public way in the Town of Lee, it being the intent and purpose of this ordinance to prohibit all persons from throwing, casting, placing or depositing snow and ice in such manner as to become a hazard to vehicular or pedestrian traffic.
- 2. In the event that a contractor is hired for snow removal and is not present at the time of the violation, the home owner, landlord or lessee shall be held responsible.
- 3. Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of up to (\$100.00) one hundred dollars.

# IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN! BARRY CONSERVATION CAMP SPONSORSHIP APPLICATION STARTING NOW!

The Lee Conservation Commission is once again sponsoring a campership for a Lee youngster, who must be at least 10 years old. The camper will go to Barry Conservation Camp, which is located in Berlin, NH in the White Mountain National Forest. The camp is operated by UNH Cooperative Extension 4-H in conjunction with the N.H. Fish and Game Department. As their brochure states, "Campers learn responsible use of firearms safe hunting practices, environmental awareness, conservation principles and an appreciation for the beautiful state we live in. There is swimming and canoeing, as well as group activities that encourage teamwork."

Lee youngsters, ages 10 and up, are eligible for this campership. (The Hunter Safety and Certification Program requires that they be 12 years and older.) It's important to apply as soon as possible as spaces fill up fast. ## One Bin at a Time - Glass

## Talking trash with Jen Messeder, LSC member

At its most basic, glass is melted sand. We can make it, but so can nature – obsidian is volcanic glass and "frozen lightning" (fulgurites) can be the result when lightning hits a sandy beach.

#### Pretty cool!

Like metal, recycling glass is as simple as melting it down and making something else. And this recycling can go on indefinitely with no loss of quality. It costs us a bit to recycle glass, but it's cheaper to recycle it than to toss it into a landfill, so recycling glass is a cost-reducer.

Glass can also be crushed back down to sand size and mixed into the sand used on roads in the winter – true recycling! Here's the scoop on recycling glass in Lee.

#### YES, please!

#### Examples:

- Bottles
- Jars
- Window panes (no frames)
- Ceramic and porcelain items (mugs, plates,
   ... as long as there's no metal on/in them)

Toilets cannot go in with the glass!

The new chute allows for small items to pass safely to the bin. For larger items, ask an attendant.





#### NOT HERE (but maybe in another bin)

- CFL light bulbs there's a table up by the office with lots of buckets on it. One of those buckets is for CFLs.
- Fluorescent tube light bulbs there's a barrel near the exit for these.
- Incandescent light bulbs these are trash.
- Pyrex
- Mirrors
- Car headlights and windshields
- Plastic caps (trash) and metal caps (small bucket by the aluminum and steel cans)

This nearly 20-year-old program provides eligible homeowners assistance of up to \$2,250 for the replacement of an aboveground heating oil tank if they meet the definition of "low-income" by U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). #### TIMELY TOPICS FOR THE WINTER SEASON

With winter approaching, the Lee Fire and Rescue Department would like to remind you of a few seasonal safety tips.

- If using live Christmas trees in your homes keep them watered. If the tree dries out and needles being to fall from your tree, promptly remove tree from your home to prevent fires. Check all lights to make sure that they are UL listed and are functioning properly before decorating tree. Inspect lights and wires for damage and do not use if damaged. Do not place live trees in close proximity to heating appliances such as heaters, wood stoves, pellet stoves or fire places. Do not place tree over any floor heating vents as it will dry the tree out faster.
- Use caution while cooking holiday meals. Keep a charged dry chemical extinguisher on hand
  for any potential oven or stove fires. If using a deep fryer for your turkey make sure you
  remove all excess water from the turkey before placing in the heated oil. Use the deep fryer
  at a safe distance from all structures and have a dry chemical fire extinguisher on hand in
  case of fire.
- Keep all exits from your home and business clear of snow and ice. Clear paths from exits for easy egress in case of fire.
- Keep all heating vents and gas regulators clear of snow and ice.
- Make sure there is a carbon monoxide detector on each floor of your home and business especially in the area outside of sleeping areas.




#### FRIENDS OF LEE LIBRARY - LEE ARTISTS' SILENT AUCTION

## SCHOOL BOARD NEWS November 20, 2019

Proposed Middle School Cost: Andre Kloetz of Bauen Corporation presented the guaranteed maximum price for the proposed middle school of \$49,847,732. This includes \$45.1 million of construction and demolition costs, and \$4.75 million of "soft costs" of internal finishings, furniture, etc. The school board will consider this as part of budget planning.

The elementary world language committee has been meeting throughout the year to review programs in other schools, study options, and recommend best practices for world language education. Many thanks to the parents and staff members who contributed to this work! The committee recommended approaches for adding world language teaching in the K-5 levels where it is not offered today. The committee's slides are included as part of the 11/20<sup>th</sup> agenda packet.

Work on the 2020-2021 budget continues. We have received updated state grant estimates and the school board will be refining the proposed budget in December. Public input in the budget is always invited. Besides regular school board meetings, there will be a budget hearing January 15<sup>th</sup>, deliberative town meeting February 4<sup>th</sup>, and vote on the budget (along with the proposed middle school and other items) on March 10<sup>th</sup>.

The school board approved collaboration between ORHS and the UNH Prevention Innovations Research Center. Over the course of 2020, ORHS students (with parental consent) will have the opportunity to participate in development of High School Healthy Relationship App. If successful, the app will be made available to schools across New Hampshire.

## **NHES Operation VET Connect**

Operation VETS Connect is a challenge to connect those who served and those who are serving and their spouses to employment, training and services they need to return to employment or into training to assist them with obtaining employment. Additional goals are to build an employer's awareness of the benefits to hiring those who served along with the awareness for those who served of the skills they have or need to build on to return to employment.

Employers are asked to register for the challenge by completing the registration form on the website under Job Fairs. (<a href="http://www.nhes.nh.gov/media/job-fairs/index.htm">http://www.nhes.nh.gov/media/job-fairs/index.htm</a>) The information from their registration form will be entered into a spreadsheet by Operations staff and made available to the offices. The employer name, industry, and town/city will also be listed on the website weekly. ESRs and LVERs should verify that the employer is registered in JMS and if appropriate, contact the employer to advise of the services available to them, including RTW and OJT.

Veterans, those currently serving and their spouses are also asked to complete a registration form on the website under Job Fairs.
