LEE COMMUNITY POWER COMMITTEE

Mission: To explore the benefits of community power

WHAT IS COMMUNITY POWER?

Under Community Power programs, local governments can procure and provide electricity to their residents and businesses on a competitive basis. By bypassing outdated regulations, Community Power programs can harness private-sector innovation to lower costs for customers and provide other energy services. Electric distribution utilities (e.g., Eversource, Liberty Utilities, NH Electric Cooperative and Unitil) will continue to deliver electricity to customers via their transmission distribution systems.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?

By aggregating purchasing power across a community, and by having greater flexibility in energy contracting than regulated utilities, Community Power programs can harness private sector innovation to lower costs for their customers. Community Power programs may choose to purchase power based on other attributes such as renewable sources. Community Power programs can also be a vehicle to construct local renewable energy projects to be the source of power for the program.

Senate Bill 286, signed into law on August 2, 2019, enables local governments to develop Community Power programs. Rules for the program have been finalized in recent months. Municipal and county governments may implement Community Power programs. Multiple local governments may join together to implement a Community Power program.

TOWN OF LEE SWAP SHOP – WINTER 2022/2023

Winter Hours of Operation: Starting December 13th until spring, the Swap shop will be closed on Tuesdays and open Thursdays and Saturdays 8am - 5pm.

Bulky Items: Saturday, December 3rd will be the last day until spring that large bulky items can be accepted at the Swap Shop. This includes, but is not limited to, Furniture, Bicycles, Outdoor Equipment, Play Sets, Exercise Equipment, Golf Clubs, or Strollers.

Smaller items: We have limited space for the winter; please limit your drop off items to one tote.

If you have many items, try using the Facebook page “Swap Shop Treasures ~ Lee, NH” or one of the local charitable groups (Goodwill, Re-Store, Salvation Army, etc.). Please note the “Swap Shop Treasures ~ Lee, NH” Facebook page is not maintained or controlled by the Town of Lee but run by a private person. Please be sure to follow the rules for whichever group you choose to use.

If the Garage Door is open, then we are open.

PLEASE DO NOT DROP OFF ANYTHING WHEN THE SWAP SHOP GARAGE DOOR IS CLOSED.

THE SWAP SHOP WILL BE CLOSED IF:

- *The schools close due to bad weather OR on Saturdays if the weather is such that the schools would have closed.*
- *If the Temperature is below 10°F wind chill.*
- *If we do not have volunteers available.*
- *If there is high winds, rain or snow.*

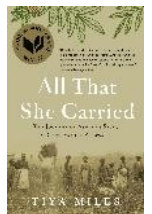

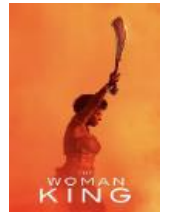

OYSTER RIVER COOPERATIVE SCHOOL BOARD NEWS – DECEMBER 21, 2022

The annual Public Hearing on the proposed 2023-2024 Oyster River Cooperative School District budget is scheduled for Wednesday, January 11, 2023, at 7:00 pm in the Oyster River Middle School Concert Hall (will be held the next day in case of inclement weather). Following the public hearing, voters will have the opportunity to debate and modify the budget at the Deliberative Session scheduled for February 7 at 7:00 pm and final decision by voters on March 14 at local elections.

School Board Member Yusi Turell announced her resignation from the school board effective in early March. This means that in addition to two at-large seats with 3-year terms which will be up for election, the school board seat representing Durham for a 1-year term will also be included on the ballot in March.

Friday, December 23 is a half-day of school in Oyster River with middle and high school students dismissed at 11:30 and elementary students at 12:30. All Oyster River Schools are closed December 24 - January 2, with classes resuming on January 3, 2023. Happy New Year!

The first Community Dinner in over 3 years is planned for February 2, 2023. Programming will be focused on Sustainability and Environmental Justice.

DEIJ coordinator Rachael Blansett presented on her engagement with ORCSD students and staff over her first 4 months with the district including needs assessment. ORCSD Communications Specialist Gen Brown and Information Technology Director Josh Olstad presented on plans for a website overhaul with a new web-hosting vendor to be completed over the next 6 months.
