LEE POLICE DEPARTMENT REMINDER

Please Do Not park any vehicles upon any roadway in Town during a snowstorm as it impedes the Highway Department from doing their job. Also, please clear the snow from your vehicle before hitting the road!

Jessica's Law has been the law of NH for about fifteen (15) years now. It is a law that **requires the clearing of ice and snow off the top of a vehicle prior to driving it**. The basis of the law was a tragic accident that claimed the life of Jessica Smith in 1999.

265:79-b Negligent Driving. – Whoever upon any way drives a vehicle negligently or causes a vehicle to be driven negligently, as defined in RSA 626:2, II(d), or in a manner that endangers or is likely to endanger any person or property shall be guilty of a violation and shall be fined not less than \$250 nor more than \$500 for a first offense and not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000 for a second or subsequent offense.

STUMPOLOGY PART 6 – SCENT POSTS By Catherine Fisher

One of the nice things about walking Lee's trails in winter is the opportunity to see evidence of who lives in the habitat you're walking through. Take a walk after a fresh snowfall, and its likely there will be tracks showing that humans aren't the only animals using these paths.

Things get even more interesting in mid-to-late January. This marks the onset of the breeding season for coyotes, fox, and bobcat begins, and it's when these species begin scent marking their territories. Both urine and scat are used to mark places along both human and wildlife trails, providing information about an animal's health, status and availability. Objects that stand out in the landscape are particularly favored, and trailside stumps, with their elevated surfaces, fit the bill nicely.

Stumps have a number of attributes that make them attractive as scent posts. The flat surfaces of stumps made by humans hold scat and urine in place. Scat and urine left on a stump are raised up, so that any passing breeze will spread the aroma throughout the surrounding landscape. When temperatures aren't freezing, stumps are damp and humid places; perfect for both releasing odors and making them last longer. Think of stumps as giant reed diffusers - wicking up scent and wafting it through the habitat.



Both male and female canids and felines scent mark their territories, and will revisit scent posts regularly, both to keep the scent fresh and to provide new information. Some scent posts are used year after year. Pictured is a deciduous stump, the remnants of a tree downed in a storm. This stump was used as a bobcat scent post for several years, though in the past two years, I've found no further sign of marking.

Though scent markings are left by animals as messages to members of their own species, the leavings are of interest to other species as well, and form a type of communication network within a habitat. Sometimes several different species will use the same scent post. Passing animals, including prey animals, will investigate scent posts to keep track of, and avoid, potential predators. Other animals keep note of scent posts as a potential resource. I saw an example of this one early spring when I was walking up one of the ravine trails in the town forest. As I rounded a bend in the trail I saw, on a stump just up ahead, a chickadee tugging vigorously at something. Using binoculars, I could see that she had a beakful of grey fur. It was clear that she was gathering nesting materials, so I waited, and sure enough back she came for another beakful. After that she didn't return, and when I examined the stump, I found a large deposit of fox scat which was mostly made up of what looked like squirrel hair. Soft things are a valuable commodity during nesting season, and this chickadee knew where to look for a mass of fluffy, if redolent, fur to line her nesting cavity.

Keep this in mind these next few months if you're walking one of Lee's trails. Romance is in the air for some of our wild residents, and perhaps you'll find that they've posted on a stump along the trail.

The Swap Shop will be <u>Closed</u> due to: High winds, rain or snow; Schools closing due to weather; Temperatures below 10°F wind chill; or the lack of volunteers.

Grief, Healing, and Resilience: A Structured Program of Support for Adults Who Have Lost Children/Grandchildren, Nieces/Nephews, Spouses/Partners, or Siblings

Mondays; April 4, 11th, 18th and 25th 5-6:30pm Chapel, Community Church of Durham, NH

At some point, most humans suffer grief, often defined as the process by which someone experiences loss. But losing a child/grandchild, niece/nephew, spouse/partner, or a sibling is an especially devastating form of seismic trauma. While grieving is very specific—based on the individual griever, the nature of the loss, and the relationship with the one who has been lost—there are many common elements to the journey. These include an emotional roller coaster at times triggered by passing comments such as "Oh, you'll get over it" or "You'll have another child," or "Don't be in denial," or "She's in a better place." This program of four 90-minute meetings is NOT clinical therapy, but it is designed to offer information and some tools for engaging with grief and healing. While spiritual in orientation, the program is non-sectarian and non-denominational. Discussion is most welcome, but no one need participate if not comfortable doing so.

Facilitator: Steve Hardy earned a graduate-level Grief Support Specialist Certificate from the University of Wisconsin in 2017. More important, he has personal experience in grief—shared with his wife Donna—through the loss of two sons. He retired in 2014 as Professor of Kinesiology and Affiliate Professor of History at the University of New Hampshire, where he won awards for teaching excellence. This is the third time he has offered the structured program. Since 2018, he has also facilitated informal grief support groups. And he has written blogs on resilience at: https://onesummit.org/what-we-do/profiles-in-resilience/

Enrollment: This program is for grieving adults who have lost a child/grandchild, niece/nephew, spouse/partner, or a sibling. BYO writing material— tablet (paper or digital), pencil, pen.
