SUPERVISOR OF THE CHECKLIST SESSIONS

The Supervisors of the Checklist will hold a session for the purpose of accepting applications for new voter registration, as well as requests for corrections to the checklist and/or change of political party affiliation on Saturday, February 26th from 10:00-10:30am at the Lee Public Library, 9 Mast Road. This will be the last opportunity to register to vote until Election Day, March 8th. Lee citizens may also register to vote at the Town Clerk's office at 249 Calef Highway during normal business hours: Monday, Wednesday, and Friday 8am-4pm through February 25th. Applicants for voter registration who possess proof of identity, age (18 years of age), citizenship, and domicile should bring that proof when they come to register. Driver's license and passport are helpful. Qualified applicants who do not possess proof or who do not bring proof with them may still register if they sign an affidavit attesting to their qualifications for identity, age, citizenship, and/or domicile.

The supervisors will hold a work session/meeting on Friday, March 4th at 9:00am at the Town Offices to approve changes to the official checklist for the Town of Lee.

THE LOVE GARDEN OF THE RED VELVET MITE By Catherine Fisher

Likely you've seen them - tiny, plush, brilliantly scarlet creatures moving so rapidly on their little legs that they seem to flow across the surface of the soil. They are red velvet mites, small arachnids belonging to the family Trombidiidae - true velvet mites. There are hundreds of species, and with the exception of the polar regions, they are found in diverse habitats across the planet. Red velvet mites are harmless, interesting creatures, who, when conditions are favorable, spend their time crawling across the ground hunting for mites and other small arthropods.



Once the days begin to warm and the ground thaws, red velvet mites will begin to emerge from their underground dens. Resembling a cross between a spider and a potato, red velvet mites have an anatomy similar to their spider relatives: four pairs of segmented legs, a pair of pedipalps for sensing objects around them, and a pair of claw-like chelicerae that act as fangs. Though they do not make webs, they do produce silk which they use to line their subterranean grottos. Because they are susceptible to desiccation, hunting primarily takes place on damp days, particularly following rain showers, hence their folk name *rain bugs*. Their entire life history is fascinating, but as Valentine's Day was on Monday, the focus here will be on their love life.

In spring, when a male red velvet mite's fancy turns to lady mites, he builds what entomologists refer to as a "love garden". Gathering twigs, blades of grass, flakes of bark and other floral bits and pieces, he constructs a mound or nest. When he is satisfied with his creation, he decorates the tips of some of the garden's leaves and sprigs with packets of his sperm, called spermatophores.

With his love garden suitably adorned, the red velvet mite is ready to seek a mate. To guide a female to his pleasure dome, he lays down a trail of pheromone-doused silk leading from the garden. Now there is nothing more for him to do but wait at the head of the trail for a female to come along.

The course of true love doesn't always run smooth, however, and there can be, on occasion, a dark side to red velvet mite romance. Should a competing male happen upon another male's love garden he will, like a miniature Berserker, utterly destroy it - tossing the twigs, leaf fragments, and bits of bark every which way. Any spermatophores the invading male finds he will bury under one of his own, so that if a female does come upon the trashed love garden, she'll be inseminated by the invader's sperm and not that of the gardener.

Often, however, the love garden is not discovered by a rival male. Instead, a female red velvet mite, drawn by the intoxicating scent laid down by the male, arrives to check out what he has on offer. To coax her down the garden path, the male has one final move: he dances for her. In some red velvet mite species courtship involves both the male and female performing a pas de deux, in other species only the male puts on a show. If his performance pleases her, the female red velvet mite proceeds down the silk trail, enters the garden and impregnates herself by sitting on one of the spermatophores.

Human beings aren't the only creatures for whom finding and winning a mate requires energy and creativity. Nature abounds with elaborate and moving courtship rituals. Though writ small, there is much to admire in the red velvet mite's mating rituals. With his soft, crimson coat, painstakingly constructed and embellished garden, pathway of scented silk and seductive dance, the red velvet mite is the perfect creature to celebrate the day when love is celebrated.

Grief, Healing, and Resilience: A Structured Program of Support for Adults Who Have Lost Children/Grandchildren, Nieces/Nephews, Spouses/Partners, or Siblings

Mondays; April 4, 11th, 18th and 25th 5-6:30pm Chapel, Community Church of Durham, NH

At some point, most humans suffer grief, often defined as the process by which someone experiences loss. But losing a child/grandchild, niece/nephew, spouse/partner, or a sibling is an especially devastating form of seismic trauma. While grieving is very specific—based on the individual griever, the nature of the loss, and the relationship with the one who has been lost—there are many common elements to the journey. These include an emotional roller coaster at times triggered by passing comments such as "Oh, you'll get over it" or "You'll have another child," or "Don't be in denial," or "She's in a better place." This program of four 90-minute meetings is NOT clinical therapy, but it is designed to offer information and some tools for engaging with grief and healing. While spiritual in orientation, the program is non-sectarian and non-denominational. Discussion is most welcome, but no one need participate if not comfortable doing so.

Facilitator: Steve Hardy earned a graduate-level Grief Support Specialist Certificate from the University of Wisconsin in 2017. More important, he has personal experience in grief—shared with his wife Donna—through the loss of two sons. He retired in 2014 as Professor of Kinesiology and Affiliate Professor of History at the University of New Hampshire, where he won awards for teaching excellence. This is the third time he has offered the structured program. Since 2018, he has also facilitated informal grief support groups. And he has written blogs on resilience at: https://onesummit.org/what-we-do/profiles-in-resilience/

Enrollment: This program is for grieving adults who have lost a child/grandchild, niece/nephew, spouse/partner, or a sibling. BYO writing material— tablet (paper or digital), pencil, pen.
