SUPERVISOR OF THE CHECKLIST NOTICE AND FUTURE SESSION

The Supervisors of the Checklist held a session for accepting applications for new voter registration, as well as requests for corrections to the checklist and/or change of political party affiliation on Saturday, February 26th. This was the last opportunity to register to vote **until** Election Day, March 8th. **Applicants for voter registration who possess proof of identity, age (18 years of age), citizenship, and domicile should bring that proof when they come to register.** Driver's license and passport are helpful. Qualified applicants who do not possess proof or who do not bring proof with them may still register if they sign an affidavit attesting to their qualifications for identity, age, citizenship, and/or domicile.

The supervisors will hold a work session/meeting on Friday, March 4th at 9:00am at the Town Offices to approve changes to the official checklist for the Town of Lee.

OLD APPLE TREE PRUNING WORKSHOP

Saturday, March 12, 2022 1 pm – 4 pm Lee Town Forest Pre-registration is required

This free workshop, sponsored by the Lee Conservation Commission, will focus on pruning old apple trees. The event is limited to 12 participants.

Orchards have long been an important feature of New England farms. As farms were abandoned, so were the trees. With gnarled trunks and tangled branches, the trees continue to provide food and shelter for wildlife. Renovating these old trees allows for improved fruit for people and wildlife.



There are a dozen old apple trees in and around an early successional opening in the Lee Town Forest. The workshop includes demonstrations and hands on opportunities. The program will be led by Bryan Cassidy, a local farmer with experience in pruning old apple trees and a passion for mentoring others in this skill. Conservation Commission members will talk about wild apple trees in the landscape.

This is an outdoor event. Dress for the weather. Pruning tools (loppers, pruning saws, pole saws) will be provided. Bring your own tools if you want. Work gloves and eye protection (safety glasses) are recommended while pruning, sawing, or brush pulling. Bring water and snacks.

STUMPOLOGY, PART 7 By Catherine Fisher

Nurse stumps are plentiful in Lee's Town Forest and other wooded areas where tree harvesting has taken place. If you come across a stump on which a tree sapling is growing, you have found a nurse stump - a tiny nursery where young trees are provided with the nutrients, moisture, light and warmth needed to thrive. Becoming a nurse stump is a process, and a stump must undergo several transformations before it is ready to become a nursery.

Most, if not all, the nurse stumps I've come across are white pine stumps, and pine stumps, you'll remember, take a long time to decay. As decomposition slowly breaks down the lignin's that formed the tree's rigid cell walls, the wood becomes less resistant to water. Moisture in the wood enables microorganisms to move in, further enhancing the process of breaking down the stump's solid structures. The stump changes from a hard, solid structure to one that is softer and more porous.



Decay makes the wood crumbly, creating openings in the stump that become filled by tiny organisms such as bacteria and fungi - hundreds of different species. Many of these are decomposers, and they help accelerate decay. As time passes, colonies of mosses and lichens form, and the stump, *like the one pictured above*, gradually becomes encased in a living coat of velvety green. Insects, sow bugs, worms, and salamanders also move in, and the stump is transformed from deadwood to habitat.

Over time, as the organisms inhabiting the stump grow and multiply, more openings are formed, creating more niches for other organisms to occupy. As individuals living in this small habitat die, their organic components accumulate in the stump's spaces and crevices, and bit by bit a humus layer is created. This process transforms the stump from a structure that supports small, non-vascular plants to one that provides the nutrients needed for tree seedlings to grow.

Every year, from late spring through fall and winter, a woodland's trees shower the forest floor with seeds. Many are eaten. Some fall in places not conducive to growth. A fortunate few land in a Goldilocks place where light, moisture, and temperature are just right for a developing seedling.

Small-seeded trees such as hemlock and birch have a particularly difficult time getting started. Birch seedlings are so weak that they cannot survive if they are covered by so much as a fallen leaf; and hemlock seeds cannot germinate unless they land in a site that is both warm and moist - a rarity in the cool, dark habitat found beneath a hemlock stand. Most seeds of these two tree species never

germinate, or if they do, they sprout in a place where they cannot thrive. For a fortunate few, however, fate, in the form of wind or a red squirrel, delivers them to one of the few places in the forest that meets their Goldilocks requirements - a well-seasoned, mossy pine stump.

The nurse stump pictured here has two hemlock saplings and a black birch growing on it. Their roots are likely embracing the outer edge of the stump, running underneath, and protected by, the stump's mossy coat. Here they have what is needed to flourish: sunlight created by the hole formed in the canopy when their stump's tree was felled, and plenty of nutrients and moisture provided by their nurse stump.

Grief, Healing, and Resilience: A Structured Program of Support for Adults Who Have Lost Children/Grandchildren, Nieces/Nephews, Spouses/Partners, or Siblings

Mondays; April 4, 11th, 18th and 25th 5-6:30pm Chapel, Community Church of Durham, NH

At some point, most humans suffer grief, often defined as the process by which someone experiences loss. But losing a child/grandchild, niece/nephew, spouse/partner, or a sibling is an especially devastating form of seismic trauma. While grieving is very specific—based on the individual griever, the nature of the loss, and the relationship with the one who has been lost—there are many common elements to the journey. These include an emotional roller coaster at times triggered by passing comments such as "Oh, you'll get over it" or "You'll have another child," or "Don't be in denial," or "She's in a better place." This program of four 90-minute meetings is NOT clinical therapy, but it is designed to offer information and some tools for engaging with grief and healing. While spiritual in orientation, the program is non-sectarian and non-denominational. Discussion is most welcome, but no one need participate if not comfortable doing so.

Facilitator: Steve Hardy earned a graduate-level Grief Support Specialist Certificate from the University of Wisconsin in 2017. More important, he has personal experience in grief—shared with his wife Donna—through the loss of two sons. He retired in 2014 as Professor of Kinesiology and Affiliate Professor of History at the University of New Hampshire, where he won awards for teaching excellence. This is the third time he has offered the structured program. Since 2018, he has also facilitated informal grief support groups. And he has written blogs on resilience at: https://onesummit.org/what-we-do/profiles-in-resilience/

Enrollment: This program is for grieving adults who have lost a child/grandchild, niece/nephew, spouse/partner, or a sibling. BYO writing material— tablet (paper or digital), pencil, pen.
