#### **CONSERVATION MONITORING IN LEE**

From now until early fall, join the Conservation Commission on Wednesday mornings as they conduct site walks on the Town's conserved properties. Some of these lands are owned by the Town, but most of them are privately owned and protected in perpetuity with a conservation easement. Monitoring begins at 9:00 am and generally takes 1½-2 hrs. Most outings require traversing through thick brush. Standard precautions for COVID, ticks & mosquitoes are advised.

#### **TOWN OF LEE PROPERTY VALUES UPDATE**

Beginning in April 2021, appraisers from the firm of Cross Country Appraisal Group, LLC will begin an update of properties for the Town of Lee. This process will be completed over the next few months resulting in new values for the fall tax bill. #### FIRE PERMITS AVAILABLE ON LINE

According to the website for the NH Division of Forests and Lands, the cost of obtaining an online burn permit will increase from \$3.00 to \$5.50 effective March 31, 2021. The online transaction fee supports the development and management of the fire permit system. The fee increase will be used for upgrades and improvements to the system such as ease of use with devices, the ability to obtain multiple permits at one time and increased functionality for the local Forest Fire Wardens and fire departments. These changes are intended to streamline the fire permitting process and should significantly enhance the public's experience obtaining their permits. The Town of Lee and State of New Hampshire do not receive any portion of these fees. Please keep in mind that seasonal permits may be obtained through the site for Category I and Category II burn permits. Seasonal permits must be renewed annually and are valid until December 31<sup>st</sup> of that year.

#### LEE TRAILS COMMITTEE

The Trails Committee, a subcommittee of the Conservation Commission, has been busy since its creation in February of this year. The committee has 14 members, divided into 3 groups working on the town-owned trails in Little River Park, the Town Forest, and Maud Jones Memorial Forest. The committee is charged with maintaining all town trails and is striving for accessibility, safety, and enjoyment on the trails.

Maud Jones: The crew assessed the 2 trails and made a plan for maintenance work which will begin in early May. They plan on re-blazing the main trail and adding blazes on the trail to the esker lookout. Also in the works is a plan for new environmental education markers.

Little River Park: After assessing the 3 trails in the park, the crew made a plan to improve the trails by painting blazes in bright, primary colors and by trimming overhanging plant growth. They will also be helping to complete the Little River Trail grant project (kiosk, bridges, and educational markers).

Town Forest: After talking with many people who walk the trails, the crew decided to make some simple changes to the trail configuration to help avoid confusion. Their goal is to make sure that the trails are accessible, safe, and enjoyable. Before more permanent blazes are painted, you may see colored blazing tape along the routes. Keep an eye out for new maps!

We need your help!

- 1. If you have an idea we want to hear about it! We welcome your ideas, input, and thoughts.
- Please do not make any changes to existing trails or add new trails on your own. The Trails Committee serves as the clearinghouse for project work under the guidance of the Conservation Commission.
- 3. Please do not paint blazes on trees or add (or take down) blazing tape on any of the trails. It is the committee's job to maintain blazes and unauthorized work makes it harder for us.
- 4. Keep a lookout for things that need help: bridges, downed trees, etc. Let the committee know what you find.

#### Presenter's Biography:

John Porter was raised on a dairy farm in Lebanon, New Hampshire. He graduated from the University of New Hampshire with a B.S. Degree in Animal Science, and then went on to get a master's degree from Cornell University in Animal Nutrition and Farm Management. Later he earned a master's degree from Bob Jones University in Education Administration. He served as a Dairy Specialist for the UNH Cooperative Extension from 1974 until his retirement in 2006. He still works parttime for UNH and operates his own consulting company, Farm Planning Services, LLC. In 2001, he coauthored the book "Preserving Old Barns"; in 2007, was editor and contributing author of "The History and Economics of the New Hampshire Dairy Industry"; and in 2011 wrote the agriculture chapter for the Concord History book, "Crosscurrents of Change". In 2019 he published a second edition of the Preserving Old Barns book. He co-authored an addendum to the dairy history book, The New Hampshire Dairy Industry in 2020.



# One Bin at a Time – Office Paper and Magazines

Talking trash with Jen Messeder, LSC member

Old habits are hard to break. We get it. And having the old Mixed Paper bin divided and redefined is surely shaking up our old habits. It's been a few months now, and we were curious how it's going.







On the left side, we're doing pretty well getting magazines and magazine-like catalogs in there.

However, some food boxes are also getting in there, so we have some room for improvement. (Food boxes are trash now, sadly.)

On the right side, we need to do a bit more work to break those old Mixed Paper habits. This side is strictly for plain (not shiny) office-type paper items. No cardboard of any kind.

And open those Valpak envelopes – the envelope itself is office-type paper, but the contents are often shiny paper.

- Basic 8.5x11 and similar paper of any color or size
- Copy paper
- Plain (not shiny) paper
- Lined notebook paper, graph paper
- Envelopes (plastic windows are okay)

If you're not sure if a thing is made of plain paper, try these "look and feel" tests.

**Look** – If the item is shiny like a magazine page, it's trash.

**Feel** – You're feeling for medium weight:

- If it feels like the type of paper you might use in a printer, it's office paper.
- If it feels like tissue paper, a business card, a post card or a cereal box, it's trash.

#### TRAVEL QUARANTINE GUIDANCE

Domestic travel within the U.S. outside of New England no longer requires quarantine upon return to NH, although people are recommended to still follow CDC's travel guidance, including wearing a well-fitted face mask while traveling, practicing social distancing, getting tested 3-5 days after travel (with a molecular or PCR-based test), and limiting public interactions after travel (even if not required to quarantine).

#### FORBEARANCE & FORECLOSURE PROTECTIONS for HOMEOWNERS

The Biden-Harris Administration recently announced an extension of COVID-19 forbearance and foreclosure protections for homeowners. The most recent actions announced will extend the foreclosure moratorium for homeowners through June 30, 2021; extend the mortgage payment forbearance enrollment window until June 30, 2021 for borrowers who wish to request forbearance; and provide up to six months of additional mortgage payment forbearance, in three-month increments, for borrowers who entered forbearance on or before June 30, 2020. #### NH FOOD BANK – UPCOMING MOBILE FOOD PANTRIES

The NH Food Bank will be hosting several mobile food pantries across the state in March & April using a drive-thru distribution model. Recipients will remain in their car and fresh produce, non-perishable items and more will be delivered right to them. These events are open to anyone in need. More information can be found here.

#### New Hampshire Emergency Rental Assistance Program - NHERAP

The application for the NH Emergency Rental Assistance Program became available on **March 15**<sup>th</sup>. This program is being managed by the NH Housing Finance Authority (NHHFA) and the funds are being administered through NH's five Community Action Partnership (CAP) agencies. #### Eligibility:

To be eligible for rental or utility assistance, at least one person in the household must have qualified for unemployment benefits, had their income reduced, had significant costs, *OR* had other financial hardship due to COVID-19. The household must be at risk for homelessness or housing instability, and meet certain income requirements. This program is for renters and landlords, not homeowners.

## OYSTER RIVER COOPERATIVE SCHOOL DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD NEWS March 17, 2021

School Board members including Student Representative Megan Deane and Superintendent Morse expressed appreciation for the leadership of Thomas Newkirk who served as School Board Chair for the last 7 years. Dr. Newkirk continues to serve as a School Board member.

Andre Kloetz of Bauen Construction provided an update on the new Middle School construction. Construction is now over 42% complete. Interior framing as well as mechanical, electrical, and pumping installation is in full swing. The dark blue layer on the exterior is a rubber sealant and is now being covered with 3 inches of foam insulation and fireproof plywood. Additional insulation is being installed on the inside of the exterior walls. The existing ORMS gymnasium will be demolished beginning over April school vacation. To make way for driveway and parking lot work.

Kendall Gray and Maggie Morrison, ORCSD Sustainability Coordinator, presented a greenhouse gas inventory for the school district. This is the first study of its kind for a public-school district in New Hampshire and will inform a Sustainability Management Plan for the district.

<u>April 19, 2021 will be teacher workshop days with no school for students</u>. This is a change to accommodate the vaccination of all ORCSD and Barrington school staff as well as licensed childcare and youth rec program personnel. The vaccination pod is being run by Strafford County Public Health Network at ORHS.

The next regular meeting of the School Board including public comments is scheduled for April 7, 2021.

In order to allow staff to focus on planning for the potential 5-full-day model, the <u>elementary</u> schools will not add Wednesdays as synchronous learning days in April as previously announced.
