State Primary Election Day is September 13, 2022. The last day for registered voters to change or declare a party affiliation is May 31, 2022. Please check to make sure you are registered in your party of choice or undeclared by following this link: https://app.sos.nh.gov/voterinformation

Undeclared voters are required to choose a Democratic or Republican ballot when they go to vote at the primary. You then become a registered member of that party unless you sign a list to return to undeclared status with the supervisors of the checklist before leaving the polling place.

You may change your party affiliation with the Lee Town Clerk, or at any scheduled meeting of the supervisors of the checklist except for during the period of time between the first day of the filing period for the primary election (June 1) and the date of the primary election itself (September 13). The Lee Town Clerk's Office is open Monday, 8am - 6pm and Wednesday and Friday 8am - 4pm. New applicants for voter registration after May 31 may declare a party when they register.

As always, applicants for voter registration who possess proof of identity, age (18 years of age), citizenship, and domicile in Lee should bring that proof when they come to register. Driver's license and passport or birth certificate are helpful. Qualified applicants who do not possess proof or who do not bring proof with them may still register if they sign an affidavit attesting to their qualifications for identity, age, citizenship, and/or domicile.

NH DRA'S ANNUAL LOW & MODERATE HOMEOWNERS PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

The Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief provisions are designed to lessen the economic burden of the State Education Property Tax on certain taxpayers. NH residents who own a homestead subject to the State Education Property Tax, resided in the homestead as of April 1st of the year for which the claim for relief is being made, and have a total household income of \$20,000 or less if a single person (or \$40,000 or less if married or head of household) may apply for property tax relief during the filing period - after May 1, 2022, but no later than June 30, 2022. SPRING AZURE: A BRIEF, GORGEOUS LIFE

With the mourning cloak, the spring azure (Celastrina ladon) is one of the first butterflies seen in

spring. Unlike the much larger mourning cloak, which hibernates as an adult, the spring azure overwinters in its pupal form, spending the freezing months snug within its chrysalis. Usually emerging in late April to early May, its brilliant blue wings, described by Robert Frost as "sky flakes", are a joy to behold.

The spring azure belongs to the Lycaenidae family which encompasses blues, coppers, harvesters and hairstreaks. Lycaenidae are commonly referred to as "gossamer-winged" butterflies, a name deriving from their shimmery, delicate wings. Like all Lycaenidae, the spring azure is a small (.75 - 1.75 wingspan), dainty butterfly, brilliantly iridescent, with eyes located at the base of and wrapping slightly around its black and white banded antennae. Male and females are of similar size and color with males, such as the one in Andrea's photograph, having a narrow black band along the upper wing margin; females have a black margin that is much broader. The underwings of both males and females are silvery gray with brown/black markings.

The spring azure begins its life as one of a cluster of eggs laid on a woody food plant such as maple leaf viburnum, members of the dogwood family, and blueberry. The tiny, flat, slug-shaped caterpillars hatch within eight days. As is the case with most Lycaenidae butterfly species, the larva has a mutualistic relationship with a number of ant species and is tended by ants who feed on the larva's sugary secretions and in return protect it from predators and parasites. This is fortunate for the larva, for, true to its appearance, it is slow and sluggish by nature, and doesn't move far from its hatching site.

Within a month or so after hatching, the larva has reached pupation stage and spins its chrysalis. In most cases, this occurs in June or early July, which means this larva spends a whopping 10-11 months as a pupa before its emergence in April or May. Almost immediately the newly emerged butterfly, if it is a male, begins patrolling along forest edges and trails searching for females. Newly emerged females often mate within hours after leaving their chrysalises. Aside from a quick sip of nectar or puddling for salts, spring azures don't do much feeding. Time is critical. Gossamer-winged butterflies are short-lived, often living but a few weeks. The spring azure doesn't have that kind of time - as an adult it lives no more than four or five days and is, perhaps, Earth's shortest-lived butterfly. From the time of hatching until the end of its life, it





spends little more than five weeks moving free, four weeks as a caterpillar and five days as a butterfly. The rest of its scant year is spent inside the shell of an egg or the confines of a chrysalis.

Emergence will be staggered over the next several weeks, so this is the time to get out and look for these small beauties. I almost always see spring azures along the power line right of way behind the library. A favorite perching area for males seems to be where the trail dips down towards the bog

and is flanked by juniper and sweet fern. The abundance of blueberry bushes along the trails, and the nearby forest makes this location a prime spring azure habitat. So head out there and enjoy these lovely sky flakes.

Blue-Butterfly Day

It is blue-butterfly day here in spring, And with these sky-flakes down in flurry on flurry

There is more unmixed color on the wing Than flowers will show for days unless they hurry.

But these are flowers that fly and all but sing: And now from having ridden out desire They lie closed over in the wind and cling Where wheels have freshly sliced the April mire.

SCHOOL BOARD NEWS - MAY 18, 2022

Six teachers are retiring from Oyster River Schools at the end of this school year. The School Board thanks and recognizes Pam Felber, Kate Ameduri, and Whitney Burke at Mast Way; Susan Jackson at ORMS; and Mary Beaton and Esther Ott at ORHS. These teachers have a combined 129 years of service to Oyster River students and the school community.

Robotics teams from Oyster River Middle School and Oyster River High School shared their 2022 seasons success with the School Board. ORMS fielded 15 teams made up of 56 students from grades 6, 7, and 8 in the VEX IQ robotics program this year. Advisors Jon Silverio and Jason Duff along with 7 team members shared their experiences, including 3 teams that participated at the World Championship in Dallas. The VEX IQ program is finishing its 4th competition season at ORMS. The ORHS FIRST Robotics team wrapped up its first competition season since the team was founded in 2020. Lead advisor Michael Hawley and 4 team members shared their experience with fundraising, teambuilding, and community outreach in addition to designing and operating their robot.

Coronavirus infections and exposures continue to affect school operations. As of May 18th, 41 district staff and 147 students are out of school due to COVID-19 infections. An additional 213 students and staff are quarantined. Staff across the district have been exceptionally flexible in covering needs from transportation to school nutrition and classrooms while staff recover in order to keep all schools open and operating. The School District thanks parents and students for their patience, flexibility, and cooperation as temporary adjustments to bus routes, concerts and events, and state testing have occurred in response to the number of students and staff out.

The remaining school board meetings for this school year are June 1st, June 8th and June 15th. June 8th is a school board workshop on communication, which is a public meeting, but with a limited agenda. The school board will not take any actions or votes. Workshop meetings are generally not televised and do not include public comments. The public is always invited to provide input by email to orcsdsb@orcsd.org.

What is the Plant A Row Program?

During the pandemic and beyond, more Granite staters are facing food insecurity. Most significantly, access to fresh and healthy, local produce.

Plant A Row is a neighbors-helping-neighbors initiative, organized through 4-H and UNH Cooperative Extension in Strafford and Rockingham County.

The idea behind this effort is simple: Planting an extra row in your garden or an extra container and donating the produce from it to a participating food pantry or a neighbor in need will directly benefit local food pantries and their patrons to get access to fresh and local produce, and overall healthier choices.

When people sign up to plant an extra row, they will be provided with a garden kit (fabric garden, row marker, sticker and colorful tote bag), growing tips, activities, recipes, and other resources. Participation is open to all ages, and participants don't need to be 4-H members to sign up. Participation in this program is free.
