### TOWN OF LEE PROPERTY REVALUATION

Cross Country Appraisal Group, LLC has recently completed a revaluation of all properties within the Town of Lee, NH for the 2021 tax year. The 2021 tax rate will be determined in the fall by the Department of Revenue Administration and the Lee Select Board and will be based on these new values, which will be reflected on the 2<sup>nd</sup> half tax bill that you will receive in December. Please do not apply the current tax rate to your new assessment as it will not be correct. A revaluation does not necessarily mean that the property tax rate will increase. Please keep in mind that changes in the town/school/county/state budget are usually the largest factors influencing your property's tax bill from year to year.

Preliminary value letters have been mailed to all Lee property owners. The new values reflect a property's assessed value as of 4/01/2021. The letter provides a description of the difference in assessed valuation from the most current value of your property to the reassessed value. Also included is information on the process for scheduling an appointment for an informal hearing so we may hear your concerns/questions relative to the new value. The contact number along with dates, times and places of these appointments were included in the notification letter and may be found below.

The average change in overall assessed value is 55.8%. Real estate prices in southern NH and nationwide have risen dramatically over the past few years and the median price of a single-family home set a record high in Strafford County in June. More than anything else, this is the factor that is driving the higher than usual change in assessed value. The State requires that all property in a municipality be assessed at its "full and true" market value. However, not all property values will change at the same rate. One purpose of a revaluation is to make sure that the assessed values reflect the changes that have occurred in property values. Market value is defined as the amount a typical, well-informed purchaser would be willing to pay for a property. For a sale to be a market value (arm's-length) sale, the seller and buyer must be unrelated and willing parties (not under pressure) to sell or buy, the property must be on the market for a reasonable length of time, the payment must be made in cash or its equivalent, and the financing must be typical for that type of property.

These appointments will be held at the Town Offices at 249 Calef Highway on August 9th, 10th and 14th.



### Insect ID Walk at Little River Park

Saturday, September 18, 2021, 1:00-3:00 PM

Sponsoring Organizations: UNH Extension, Town of Lee Conservation Commission, USDA Forest Service

Join us on Saturday, September 18 from 1-3pm for an educational workshop focused on techniques for finding, collecting, and identifying insects on your property. USFS Entomologist Marc DiGirolomo will demonstrate several collection techniques as we explore a variety of habitat types and discuss the insects that make their home at Little River Park in Lee, NH. Pinned insect specimens will also be on display showcasing some of New Hampshire's diverse insect populations. The workshop will involve an easy walk through the trails and habitats of Little River Park and the adjacent Mills Reserve.

Marc is an entomologist with the USDA Forest Service's Forest Health Protection group in Durham, NH serving all of New England and New York. Marc specializes in the detection, monitoring, and identification of forest insect pests, with an emphasis on woodboring and bark beetles.

This walk is being held as part of the 2021 NH BioBlitz, an effort to get community members out exploring species on town-owned lands all over New Hampshire during the month of September. Attendees are invited to participate in the BioBlitz effort by submitting their insect species observations to iNaturalist. This event is free, but space is limited due to current UNH COVID-related policies. Registration is required.

What to Bring: Sturdy footwear, comfortable clothing, water, and snacks. A hand lens is recommended but is not required. Please dress appropriately as we will be outdoors and walking on and off trail in open fields and woods.

## Conservation Commission Easement Monitoring Notes from 7-28-2021 Spotted Jewelweed

Easement monitoring can be hungry work, and some conserved lands can stimulate the appetite more than others. The easement monitored last Wednesday is one of them. Encompassing 61 acres with much of the eastern boundary along the Oyster River, this is a sizable easement, and a large part of it is farmed. Growing a variety of fruits and vegetables, the farm has a stand where people can purchase produce, as well as a pick-your-own option- always an enjoyable family activity.

Our route was an easy walk along the mowed perimeter of the farm. We walked the northern border past rows of laden blueberry bushes, then along the eastern boundary with the river on our left and first a pond and field of grasses and forbs that gave way to apple trees on our right. Despite the blistering June and the heavy rains of July the crop looked bountiful. Heading up the southern border we passed native shrubs and wildflowers. A gorgeous cedar waxwing, her beak loaded with nest-building materials flew into the shrubbery - right on schedule for raising a second brood.

Nearing the end of our circuit, we walked along the western side of the easement with, to our right, row upon row of apples and peaches. The latter were beautiful - plump and a mouth-watering red. After the uphill hike, it was easy to imagine biting into one, the juice running down one's chin. We were told it would be a few more weeks before these were ripe enough to harvest. Can't wait!
