Wednesday, August 31, 2022 6:00pm – 7:00pm Lee Public Safety Complex, 1st Floor, 20 George Bennett Road, Lee

Applicants for voter registration who possess proof of identity, age (18 years of age), citizenship, and domicile in Lee should bring that proof when they come to register. Driver's license and passport or birth certificate are helpful. Qualified applicants who do not possess proof or who do not bring proof with them may still register if they sign an affidavit attesting to their qualifications for identity, age, citizenship, and/or domicile.

State Primary Election Day is September 13, 2022. The polls will be open at Mast Way School from 7:00am - 7:00pm. The last day for registered voters to change a party affiliation WAS May 31, 2022. Undeclared voters are required to choose a Democratic or Republican ballot when they go to vote at the primary. You then become a registered member of that party unless you sign a list to return to undeclared status with the supervisors of the checklist before leaving the polling place.

THE BALD-FACED HORNET: FANNING TO REGULATE TEMPERATURES IN THE NEST

Our bedroom windows overlook the backyard and the forest beyond, but they also overlook back the porch, particularly the place where the porch and the house meet and create a warm, southfacing corner. Years ago, we'd occasionally have a queen baldfaced hornet, a social wasp of the Vespidae family; choose that cozy corner as the site to start a colony, affording us a fantastic view of how this species constructs a paper nest.

Nest-making began in late spring when the queen formed a small circle of papery brood



cells for the eggs of her nest's first workers, then covered them with a thin gray dome of paper with a hole in the bottom for entering and exiting. The queen did all the work for the foundation of the colony - paper making, egg laying, and cleaning and provisioning the wasp larvae. Once the first workers had pupated and taken on the tasks of nest-cleaning, paper making, nest-building, foraging, and feeding the larvae, the queen's work was pared down to egg-laying, and she no longer left the nest. As summer progressed, the nest grew to a substantial conical structure, a home to hundreds of female workers.

Besides the bottom entrance hole, there were several openings near the rounded top of the nest. These acted as vents, allowing air to flow through the entrance at the bottom of the nest and out through the top. It was during a hot dry spell one summer that I first observed worker hornets fanning at the entrance to the nest. Fanning is a technique used by honeybees to facilitate airflow through the nest and to help regulate temperatures during warm spells, but I had never come across information about bald-faced hornets using the same technique. While honeybees age out of and into various hive chores, I could find no research showing that bald-faced hornets, as they grow older, advance from one type of nest duty to another. Somehow, all the nest chores, including fanning, get done, but how each wasp settles on a particular assignment doesn't seem to have been investigated. Given how protective they are of their nest, I imagine it would be difficult to conduct research on a living colony. However the wasps determine who is on fanning duty, it was fascinating to watch as, on hot days, workers arrived with food for larvae or mouthfuls of ground-up

wood for nest construction, while other workers emerged and positioned themselves at and around the nest entrance and vigorously fanned their wings.

It's been decades since a queen has constructed a nest in that sunny corner outside our window, and I've missed being able to watch them, particularly during hot weather. So, when Dotty Lavoie told me about a wasp nest under construction near her apartment building, I asked her to keep me posted. As the nest was situated near the edge of the building's parking area and quite close to the apartment building itself, folks were concerned about being stung, and there was discussion about having the nest removed. Instead, Dotty alerted residents living near the nest. To ensure everyone got the message, she placed a sawhorse in the parking space nearest the nest and attached a sign warning of the nest's proximity and giving information about the natural history of bald-faced hornets and their usefulness as predators of flies and yellow jackets. The nest has grown considerably over the past few months, and the wasps are very active. Still, thanks to Dotty's efforts, there have been no adverse interactions between residents and wasps.

Throughout the summer, Dotty has photographed the wasp nest and has sent me occasional emails with her observations. Describing the fanning activity I'd observed years ago, I asked her to look for that behavior during hot days. The nearly two-week heatwave that we recently experienced gave Dotty ample opportunities. Though the layers of paper do provide insulation and protection from both cold and heat, extended temperature extremes require extra work to keep the nest temperatures within the range necessary for the wasp larvae growing within. During the heatwave, when both temperature and humidity were often extreme, the entrance to the wasp nest was crowded with fanning wasps. Dotty described her empathy as she watched these insects work constantly to maintain the temperature necessary to support the larvae developing inside. Dotty stood within a few feet of their nest to take photographs, including the one accompanying this article, but the wasps paid her no attention. With the heatwave behind us, it's now business as usual in the nest, with workers constantly coming and going, bringing in food and building materials. This activity will continue until mid-to late autumn when cold temperatures will kill all the members of the nest. Weeks before life in this colony ends, new queens and drones will emerge and mate in a nuptial flight, after which the young, fertile queens will shelter in stumps or under rotten logs. Thanks to Dotty, who is a good neighbor to both humans and wasps, some of the queens born and raised in this nest will emerge In spring, ready to start a new generation.



Drought Again --Let's Conserve Water August 18, 2022

Here we go again. Despite the recent rain, NH continues to be engulfed in drought, with 13% of the state, including half of Strafford County, rated D2, Severe Drought.

Most Lee residents harvest groundwater using residential wells, so we all share the same water. Please practice these easy ways to conserve:


- Eliminate non-essential water use such as lawn watering, car washing, and other non-essential activities.
- Reduce shower times, do only full loads of laundry, and turn off the faucet while brushing teeth, doing dishes, and washing hands.
- Fix any leaks or drips in your household water system, including outside fixtures and hoses.
- Replace harmful chemical cleaning products with safer, non-toxic and biodegradable alternatives. Polluted groundwater is groundwater lost.
- Never allow gasoline, oil, pesticides, antifreeze, or paint down your drains.
- Encourage your children to share and practice what they've been taught about conserving natural resources. Make conserving a family practice.

A few more ideas for water conservation, not quite as easy:

- Update fixtures and appliances to the newer water-saving models.
- Replace asphalt with naturally draining surfaces so rainwater is absorbed.
- Plant trees and other plants in your yard.
- Support and volunteer for environmental and conservation organizations.
- Join the Lee Sustainability Committee!

LEE FIRE DEPARTMENT SAFETY TIPS FOR A SAFE SUMMER

- <u>Grill safety</u>: You should keep your grill clean and free from grease build up to prevent a grill fire. Grills should be used at least ten (10) feet away from any structure. Grills are not allowed to be used on balconies, decks or patios of any multifamily apartment buildings per State Fire Code.
- <u>Outdoor fires</u>: Burn permits are required for all outdoor open flame burning (except for propane fueled appliances and charcoal grills). Burn permits may be purchased online at the <u>Division of Forests and Lands</u> or obtained at the Fire Department. Please read and follow all State of NH outdoor burning regulations.
- **3.** <u>Swimming and boating</u>: Please follow State of NH boating regulations while boating. Wear life jackets while boating and use caution while swimming as the water temperatures may still be cold.
- 4. <u>Fireworks</u>: Class C fireworks are permissible per town ordinance and State of NH Regulations. There is no permit required to purchase, possess or use Class C fireworks in the Town of Lee. Class B fireworks require a permit for use in the Town of Lee and must follow all State of NH guidelines. <u>CLICK HERE</u> State of NH Fire Marshal's Fireworks Safety Brochure.
