
JOIN IN ON THE 9th ANNUAL LEE FAIR TRACTOR PARADE!

One Bin at a Time – Plastic #1 Talking trash with Jen Messeder, LSC member

In partnership with the Lee Solid Waste Committee

Ah, #1. The trickiest of the plastics we can recycle in Lee.

No doubt you've noticed a lot of #1 bottles, boxes and "clam shells" in your life. You've also no doubt noticed that the bin for #1 plastic is only for bottles and jars - boxes and clam shells need not apply.

Why? This gets back to our earlier discussion about how plastic manufacturers can take a type of resin and form it in a lot of different ways, each with its own look and functionality. One big difference between #1 bottles/jars and #1 boxes/clam shells is that the boxes and clam shells melt more easily. If they're tossed in the recycling machine with the bottles and jars, they melt first and gum up the machine.

YES, please!	
Examples:	
Soda, water and mouthwash bottles	
Cooking oil bottles

Any size (up to 2.5 gallons)	
 Any color (except brown) 	
Caps are now okay, for all plastics	

NOT HERE (but maybe in another bin)	
#1 boxes and clam shells Ask your grocery store nicely if they will take back containers from items you purchased at their store. (And if these items actually get recycled.)	
#1 brown bottles	
Anything over 2.5 gallons, like the 5 gallon	
bottles that go on water coolers.

RECENT CHANGES AT THE LEE TRANSFER STATION

Presented by Dean Rubine, Solid Waste Advisory Committee

A changing world means changes to how we recycle in Lee.

Mixed paper has changed. In particular, wet strength paper is no longer acceptable. That is paper that holds its strength when wet. It gums up the pulping machines; therefore, recycling companies are no longer accepting it. Wet strength is primarily used for beer and soda can cases and frozen food. Most other containers are acceptable mixed paper, which absorbs water then pulps when rubbed.

ACCEPTABLE: Cereal boxes, mac and cheese boxes, OTC medication boxes and the like, known as chipboard, are acceptable as mixed paper. Paper egg cartons, magazines, books without covers, office paper and paper mail, including envelopes, are acceptable.

NOT ACCEPTABLE: Waxy paper, wet strength paper, wrapping paper, tissue paper or paper towels are NOT permitted as mixed paper. If you're not sure ask the staff. Paper towels can be composted.

If your paper isn't newspaper bin or mixed paper bin worthy, it goes into the regular trash (MSW) bin. There's no need to bag it; you may collect it in a bin and throw it in the MSW unbagged.

Glass has changed. We can now accept glass bottles and jars only. No Pyrex, porcelain, ceramics or other non-glass material is allowed. Toilets, mirrors, windows and the like are Construction Debris. Please ask the staff for assistance in disposal.

Plastic. In a rare bit of good news, it is now acceptable to leave the caps on plastic bottles. That applies to all three types, #1 water/soda bottles, milk jugs and solid shampoo/detergent jugs. Containers larger than two and a half gallons are not allowed.

Compost. The town's food waste composting pilot program is going great. Sign up at sbullek@leenh.com to participate.

The Town will provide special compostable bags to bring the food waste to the Transfer Station. Mr. Fox, a company specializing in food waste composting, will then transport the food waste to their facility in Eliot, Maine where it will be composted into a soil like material.

TIMELY TOPICS FOR THE SUMMER SEASON

Pool Safety Never leave a child unattended in or near water. Teach your children how to swim. Teach children to stay away from the drains at the bottom of pools. Ensure all pools and spas have compliant drain covers Install proper barriers on or around the pool to keep children and animals from falling in. Keep plugged in electrical appliances away from the pool or spa. Know how to perform Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on children AND adults.

Always wear an approved Personal Floatation Device (PFD) while boating. Do not consume alcohol while operating a boat.

Make sure your boat is properly outfitted with all required safety equipment including a fire extinguisher, floatation devices, PFDs for all riders, a signal device (air horns or whistles), and lights for operating at night.

Abide by all boating regulations Take a Safe Boating Class

Limit activity outside during times of high heat index and humidity.

Be aware of the signs and symptoms of heat exhaustion and heat stroke especially in young children and the elderly.

Symptoms of heat exhaustion include: headache, weakness, increased thirst, pale cool skin, profuse sweating and nausea. If these symptoms exist then remove person from hot environment and treat with fluids and rest. If symptoms don't resolve or if they worsen seek medical attention.

Symptoms of heat stroke include: severe headache, weakness and dizziness, confusion, nausea and vomiting, skin is dry flushed and warm to touch, no sweating, seizures, unconscious and rapid breathing and heart rate. Heat stroke is a true medical emergency and 911 should be called immediately. Remove the person from heat, wet them with cool water and DO NOT give them anything by mouth.

Do not leave children or pets in vehicles during warm periods.
 Keep pets indoors or in shaded areas outside with plenty of cool water during hot days.

School Board News for August 7, 2019

Construction on **safety enhancements at the entrances of Moharimet and ORHS** will be nearly complete by the start of school. These projects were both supported by voters and State grant funding.

The Athletic Director has proposed forming **cooperative girls and boys lacrosse teams** with Newmarket High School in order to ensure that the teams are large enough to provide opportunities for players to develop and be competitive. This proposal will be discussed at a future school board meeting.

The Board adopted **goals for the 2019-2020 school year** focused on improving communication, engaging the community about the proposed new middle school, and developing next steps on assessment of competency-based-education (CBE).

The proposed middle school (including architect Ron Lamar) and next steps on CBE are expected to be reviewed at the August 21st school board meeting.

The ORCSD Child Nutrition program continues to grow. Child Nutrition Director Doris Demers shared that thanks to recently enacted law SB 82, the State is providing additional funding so that all students who are eligible for free or reduced lunch will also be able to receive free **school breakfast** each school day starting this fall. The Board will also consider an update to the ORCSD Wellness policy that adds sourcing local fresh foods as a component.

August 28th is the first day of school for Oyster River students for 2019-2020.
