One Bin at a Time – Steel Cans

Talking trash with Jen Messeder, LSC member

In partnership with the Lee Solid Waste Committee

Whew! We're done with the tricky plastic items. Back to materials that are easier to recycle, but that we still make money on – steel (and aluminum) food cans.

Because these are basic metal resources, recycling steel and aluminum food cans is as simple as melting them down and making something else out of them. And this recycling can go on indefinitely with no loss of quality.

And they're fairly simple to recycle – not too many ifs, ands or buts. So, let's just dive into it.

YES, please!	
 Steel cans, including spray cans: Must be completely empty and "trash clean" Remove plastic buttons, caps and lids You don't need to remove paper labels 	
Aluminum food cans (pet or human); even though these are made of aluminum, they go in with the steel food cans.	ITTERS

NOT HERE (but maybe in another bin)	
Aluminum foil and pie plates; they get their own barrel near the steel cans.	
 Caps and lids: Metal caps and lids can go in the bucket between the glass and steel can bins Plastic caps might be able to go with the other plastics – ask a staff member

RECENT CHANGES AT THE LEE TRANSFER STATION

Presented by Dean Rubine, Solid Waste Advisory Committee A changing world means changes to how we recycle in Lee.





Acceptable mixed paper

Regular Trash

Mixed paper has changed. In particular, **wet strength** paper is no longer acceptable. That is paper that holds its strength when wet. It gums up the pulping machines; therefore, recycling companies are no longer accepting it. Wet strength is primarily used for beer and soda can cases and frozen food. Most other containers are acceptable mixed paper, which absorbs water then pulps when rubbed.

ACCEPTABLE: Cereal boxes, mac and cheese boxes, OTC medication boxes and the like, known as chipboard, are acceptable as mixed paper. Paper egg cartons, magazines, books without covers, office paper and paper mail, including envelopes, are acceptable.

NOT ACCEPTABLE: Waxy paper, wet strength paper, wrapping paper, tissue paper or paper towels are NOT permitted as mixed paper. If you're not sure ask the staff. Paper towels <u>can</u> be composted. If your paper isn't newspaper bin or mixed paper bin worthy, it goes into the regular trash (MSW) bin. There's no need to bag it; you may collect it in a bin and throw it in the MSW unbagged.

Glass has changed. We can now accept glass bottles and jars only. No Pyrex, porcelain, ceramics or other non-glass material is allowed. Toilets, mirrors, windows and the like are Construction Debris. Please ask the staff for assistance in disposal.

Plastic. In a rare bit of good news, it is now acceptable to recycle the caps on plastic bottles (please remove first.) That applies to all three types, #1 water/soda bottles, milk jugs and solid shampoo/detergent jugs. Containers larger than two and a half gallons are not allowed.

TIMELY TOPICS FOR THE FALL SEASON

With school starting up again and the season getting ready to change, the Lee Fire and Rescue Department would like to offer some friendly safety tips.

- Please be careful while driving through town now that school is back in session. Be sure to fully stop for all buses picking up and dropping off kids until the school bus operator turns off their signal lights and allows traffic to continue.
- Go slow and obey the speed limit in the school zone especially while the reduced speed limit is in effect during morning drop off and afternoon pick up times.
- As the leaves begin to fall and yard clean ups begin, we would like to remind everyone that a burn permit is required for all outside fires. Come down to the fire department during business hours and we would be happy to issue you the appropriate permit.
- Have your home heating appliances serviced so that they are working properly and not emitting carbon monoxide. With colder nights ahead heating systems will be fired up and service is recommended for gas and oil fired systems.
- Be sure that you have working carbon monoxide detectors. Carbon monoxide detectors should be located on each level of your residence including directly outside any bedroom areas.
- For those who heat with wood, have your chimney cleaned and inspected by a professional chimney sweep to reduce the risk of chimney fires this season. Burn seasoned hardwood or kiln dried hardwood to reduce the build-up of creosote in your chimney.

WHAT

The village concept provides an alternative to retirement community living by allowing seniors to stay in their homes through community-based support. There are presently some 200 "villages" across the country and approximately 150 being formed. The Seacoast Village Project (SVP) was launched over a year ago and now has achieved non-profit 501(c)3 status. It initially encompassed Portsmouth, Exeter and neighboring towns, but now work is underway to extend the SVP to include Dover, Durham, Madbury, Lee and Newmarket.

SCHOOL BOARD NEWS FOR SEPTEMBER 4TH

At the September 4th meeting, the school board and administrators recognized the custodial staff for their dedication and excellent work preparing schools for the start of the school year. The opening day enrollment of the Oyster River Schools was 2219.

The school board and Oyster River Teachers' Guild have unanimously approved a proposed 5 year contract covering 2020-2025 school years. This agreement will be presented to voters for approval in March.

Athletic Director Andrew Lathrop will be investigating forming cooperative high school lacrosse teams with Newmarket High School. The proposal would have both girls' and boys' teams based at ORHS with players from both schools.

The school board also discussed financing options for the proposed new middle school building. This is important to estimating the budget and tax impact of the project. The construction manager will present a Guaranteed Maximum Price by mid-November. There will be several opportunities for the community to learn about and discuss the proposal at school board meetings or at school and community events this fall ahead of a vote at the March 2020 election.
