# All: Judging and Awards

The judging was completed before the meeting. Thanks again to our outside judges. We divided the entries into kids and others (otherwise the kids would have won everything.) In the kids' categories, each of the three entries won first place in one of the three categories. For the remaining entries, we awarded 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place in the three categories. We awarded Best in Show.

# Jen: Elementary School Participation and Catherine Fisher's Efforts

The school is invited to the BFI event at the Grange, and indications are they will attend. Jen will ask Principal Vaich if there will be an event at the school. Paul will give contact info to Jen.

## Chuck/Paul: Planning for Backyard Farming Initiative (BFI) Celebration 1/28/19

Dean moved, Jen 2<sup>nd</sup>, motion to spend up to \$100 on food, plates and utensils for BFI 1/28. Approved 4-0, public concurs.

Dean moved, Jen 2<sup>nd</sup>, motion to spend \$200 on engraved wood plaques which can be gently hung on the winning trees, with Dave Minor the preferred vendor, others permissible. Approved 4-0. Don Quigley offered to engage Dave Minor; Paul will encourage him to do so.

Ideally, 7 plaques: First place all three categories. We need two of each, kids and adults, though I don't think we need to indicate that on the plaque. Plus Best In Show

Dear Lee Select Board,

The Lee Sustainability Committee, in its capacity as an advisory committee, requests of the Lee Select Board that you vote to recommend the passage of the non-binding resolution regarding nuclear disarmament as presented by citizen's petition to appear on the March, 2019 ballot. Approved 4-0. Paul will send.

# C. Initiatives for 2019 (Ongoing and New): Jen and Paul

Reviewed list from last agenda: Low Carbon Diet, BFI, Compost/Waste Stream/Swap Shop/Reusing material, Fair, Town Center

Adding: Lee's Trees

Jen personated sustainability stones, e.g. "Unity," for Lee Fair paperweights. Asks for words for other rocks.

Paul wants to develop and launch a campaign around "useless – use less." It would be about making better choices by using less. Useless campaign to use less. Paul's working on his puns and eventually T shirts.

Chuck: Talked to member Matt Rowell. Idea to make the town more supportive of Cottage Industries. Zoning changes. Work at home. Agriculture is allowed in all zones in town; cottage industry should be as well. In Amish country there are signed for jams, honey, birdhouses, music lessons, other services, that households use to supplement their income. Dean: Does Lee have rules against cottage industry? Chuck: we can make the laws more encouraging at the municipal level. Paul: State level, too. Encourage apprenticeships.

Chuck: Concerned with litigiousness of society and issues of liability. Dean: That stops a lot of our initiatives. Paul: We're not going to solve that problem here. Chuck: Let's look into changes to building codes to encourage sustainability. For example, unstamped building material harvested and milled locally is unacceptable to inspectors. Chuck will investigate.
