A. Introductions Otis Perry is Chuck's friend, long time Dover resident and volunteer, currently serving on Dover's Energy Committee. He's here to explore the possibility of a Dover Sustainability Committee. Welcome, Otis.

Apparently the ORCSD Sustainability Committee is supporting an ORCSD intern from UNH exploring the addition of a charging station to Mast Way. The group met Friday in the library for 30 minutes, Mary, Paul G, and Justin Klingler, a public policy masters student with an interest in sustainability. A Mast Way charging station would cost \$25K to install, \$5K of that offset through funds (VW emissions settlement), report including survey to go to school board.

Re: Charging station. Dover's parking garage has a charging station, paid for out of VW Diesel cheating settlement money within the last year. Garage built 3 years ago. Contact Bill Simons, Dover Parking Services Coordinator for more details. There is contention for parking at charging spots.

A. Waste Reduction/Composting:

Dean: didn't get a chance to ask Toby vanAken about the composting money in the transfer station budget.

Dean got a few people riled enough about pay per bag to show up at the Solid Waste Committee meeting a couple of weeks ago. He was hoping to attract some new members, which may have actually worked. Unfortunately, he left before the pay per bag discussion to go to the Lee's Trees event.

Otis Perry re. Pay Per Bag. PpB reduced the amount of trash by 35%. Most people in town opposed. Didn't factor in cost of recycling. Bags cover tipping and collection. Program instituted 16 years ago.

Dean: Forward NRRA meeting information

Jen: Presented method for presenting and implementing projects. Uses a large 11x17 inch-like piece of paper to chart progress for identifying problems, goals, solutions and evaluation of outcomes.

Chuck: Packaging, Regulations, plastics are challenging for landfills.

Jen: Curiosity / explanation. What's in your trash bag? Lee Fair activity.

Otis: Dover had interns visit dump, dump out and measured each kind of trash in bag
