







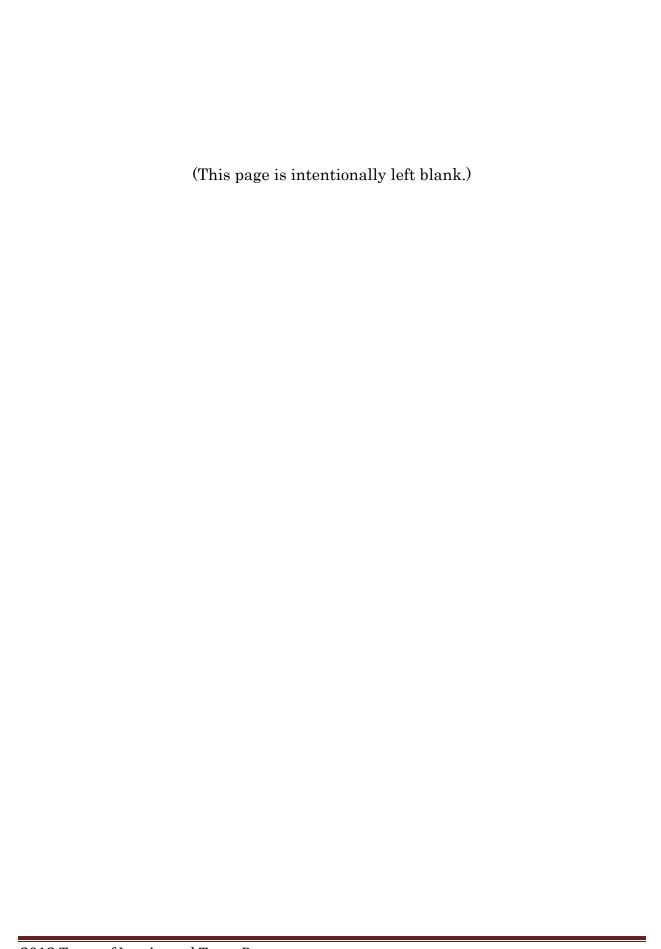

TOWN OF LEE, NEW HAMPSHIRE Minutes of the 2012 Deliberative Session February 4, 2012

The February 2012 Town of Lee Deliberative Session was called to order at 9:00 a.m. at the Mast Way Elementary School by Moderator Jan Neill.

She stated that she does not follow Robert's Rules of Order; however, she would like to see courtesy, civility, consideration and common sense guide the Deliberative Session. She invites all to participate in discussion. This meeting is for transaction of all business other than voting by official ballot.

Moderator Neill introduced the Selectmen and Town Administrator.

The Town Administrator covered key points of the meeting.

Dwight Barney moved to limit Power Point presentations to a maximum of fifteen (15) minutes for each Article. Karen Long seconded the motion. By a show of voter cards, the motion has passed.

ARTICLE 1.

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

There being no discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot.

ARTICLE 2.

Are you in favor of the adoption/amendment of the zoning ordinance, as proposed by the Lee Planning Board to the 2012 Lee Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Note: Changes are Bold Italics and Deletions are underlined.

The 2011 Lee Zoning Ordinance, if amendments/changes/additions are passed by Town vote this March, this will change to the 2012 Lee Zoning Ordinance. The proposed changes are as follows;

Article IV. For the purpose of this ordinance, the Town of Lee is divided into three (3) four (4) zones: the Residential Zone (Zone A), the Commercial Zone (Zone C), the Light Commercial Zone (Zone LC) and the Wet Soils Conservation Zone and Aquifer Conservation District, as shown on the Official Map dated March 11, 1969 and amended March 2, 1976: March 8, 1977; September 14, 1982; March 12, 1985; March 12, 1986, March 14, 1989, June 1, 2012 and filed with the Town Clerk. Said Official Map is a part of this ordinance and is incorporated herein by reference.

Residential Zone (Zone A): Shall comprise of the entire town with the exception of Zone C and Zone LC.

Commercial Zone (Zone C): Shall comprise that area north and south of Route 4 as outlined below, and as shown on the Official Zoning Map. Starting at the Junction of Routes 4 and 125, running east for one thousand (1,000) feet along Route 4, and then North parallel to Route 125 to the Lee-Barrington Town Line. Thence running South

along the Lee/Barrington Town Line to five hundred (500) feet South of the Route 4 right-of-way. Thence running East parallel to Route 4 to a point one thousand (1,000) feet East of the Lee Traffic Circle. Also running south of the junction of Route 4 and Route 125 five hundred (500) feet East and West of the Route 125 right-of-way to the junction of Route 125 and Steppingstone Road.

Light Commercial Zone (Zone LC): Shall comprise the land known as Lee Tax Map #25-03-000, a single parcel of 91.35 (+/-) acres.

Wet Soils Conservation Zone: As defined in Article XV herein.

Aquifer Conservation District: Shall be superimposed over all other zones and is defined in Article XIII herein.

New Article: VI-a, Light Commercial Zone (Zone LC)

Article VI-a

Light Commercial Zone (Zone LC)

- A. The following uses shall be permitted:
 - 1. Business offices providing the following services;
 - a. Financial
 - b. Insurance
 - c. Real Estate
 - d. Engineering/Architecture/Computer design of all types
 - e. Publishing and data processing
 - f. Legal
 - g. Social services
 - h. Health services
 - i. Educational services
 - j. Research and development
 - k. Medical, such as doctors, dentist, optometrist, occupational therapy, physical therapy, or other specialized medical office uses, service laboratories and offices accessory to these.

2. Light Industry/Commercial Uses:

- a. Processing, assembling, mixing, packaging, finishing, decorating, or repair products conducted in spaces and/or building(s) but excluding basic industrial processing such as casting and forging.
- b. Warehousing.
- c. Counter sales/mercantile; an occupancy used for the display and sale of merchandise in support of the processing (a. above) or warehousing (b. above).
- d. The growing, production and wholesale of agricultural crops in a building or other enclosed structure.
- e. The commercial raising, harvesting, and wholesale of fish or other aquacultural products in a building or other enclosed structure.
- f. The raising of bees and the production of honey.

B. Special Provisions

- 1. No residential uses shall be allowed in Zone LC.
- 2. No commercial excavation of gravel/rock or other natural material shall be allowed in Zone LC.
- 3. The land comprising Zone LC shall not be subdivided except to the extent that the entire site is developed as and held in the condominium form of ownership.

- 4. No use shall be allowed in Zone LC that emits a regulated toxic air pollutant, as defined in NH RSA 125-I:4, into the ambient air except air emissions resulting from the combustion of virgin petroleum products, natural gas, propane, and biodiesel as defined in NH Env-A 1402.02(a)(4), by mobile and stationary sources.
- 5. There shall be no storage outside of the primary building.

C. Setbacks/Buffers

- 1. A minimum 125 foot perimeter buffer of the site shall be left in its natural state, undisturbed with the exception of (i) walking trails approved by the Lee Planning Board and (ii) site access. If a septic location requires an encroachment into the perimeter buffer it shall be permitted with approval by the Lee Planning Board.
- 2. No building or parking area shall be within 25 feet of the perimeter buffer.
- 3. Only utility service may be permitted within the perimeter buffer with Planning Board approval.
- 4. A setback of 25 feet shall be maintained along and from the easement line of the pond on site for all building/structures. Walking trails may be permitted along with resting/picnic area(s) within the easement and perimeter buffer if permitted by the easement and approved by the Planning Board.
- 5. Buildings on site shall be a minimum of 50 feet apart. Access around each building shall be permitted if required for fire protection. Parking and access shall be permitted within the 50 foot separation area.
- D. Aquifer Ordinance: The provisions of Article XIII A and E, (or applicable Article for aquifers) of this ordinance shall override any provisions set forth herein. The impervious coverage requirements, specified in Article XIII shall not apply to Zone LC.
- E. Wet Soils Ordinance: The provisions of Article XV, (or applicable Article for wet soils) of this ordinance shall override any provisions set forth herein.
- F. Site Plan Review Regulations: Site Plan review regulations for the Town of Lee shall apply to all activities located in Zone LC.
- G. Building Regulations: The Building Regulations for the Town of Lee shall apply to any construction within Zone LC.

H. Signage:

- 1. Entrance Sign. There shall be a single entrance sign permitted for purposes of identifying the site. The entrance sign shall have one name only such as "Noble Farm Business Park", "Lee Business Park" or such other name that has been approved by the Planning Board. The location of the entrance sign shall be approved by the Planning Board as part of site plan review taking into account site access and overall site development. It shall be constructed of natural materials such as wood, masonry, or granite. The aggregate square feet of the entrance sign shall not exceed 32 square feet. The top of such sign shall not be greater than 6 feet in height, measured from the crown of the road. The sign shall be illuminated by down lighting.
- 2. Internal Signs. One commercial sign shall be permitted for each business use. The sign shall not exceed 16 square feet, shall be free-standing, and shall be in close proximity to the entrance of the business use. The sign shall be made of natural materials. The top of the sign shall not be greater than 4 feet in height, measured from the crown of the internal access road. The sign shall be illuminated by down lighting.

- 3. No other signage shall be permitted in Zone LC except signage related to traffic and safety.
- 4. All signage for Zone LC shall be subject to approval by the Planning Board.

There being no discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the expenditure of the sum of up to five hundred and fourteen thousand dollars (\$514,000) to complete the Multiuse Artificial Turf Field at Little River Park. a) To authorize the withdrawal of two hundred and sixty-four thousand dollars (\$264,000) from the town's fund balance. b) Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) from a private donor. c) Two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) from outside of town funding sources, such as US Soccer or other outside funding sources. (The Selectmen do not recommend this appropriation by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

Geoffrey Carlton moved Article 3. A second was made.

Mr. Carlton made a motion to amend the Article as follows:

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of up to four hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$410,000) to complete the Multiuse Artificial Turf Field at Little River Park. a) To authorize the withdrawal of one hundred and eighty thousand dollars (\$180,000) from the town's fund balance. b) Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) from a private donor. c) One hundred and eighty thousand dollars (\$180,000) from outside of town funding sources, such as US Soccer or other outside funding sources.

Roger Rice seconded the motion.

Mr. Carlton gave a Power Point presentation.

A lengthy discussion followed with comments from Noel Jost-Coq, Tom Loureiro, David Cedarholm, Wendy Fogg, Todd Allen, Dawn Genes, Winfield Bassage, John LaCourse, Kurt Aldag, William Henze, and John Puffer.

By a show of voter cards, the amendment passes.

John LaCourse moved to amend the Article as follows:

To see if the town will vote to *raise and appropriate* the sum of zero *dollars (\$0)* to complete the Multiuse Artificial Turf Field at Little River Park.

Dwight Barney seconded.

Again there is a lengthy discussion with comments from John LaCourse, Geoff Carlton, Todd Allen, Bill Henze, David Cedarholm, Mary Cobb, Wendy Fogg, Tom Dolan, and Alan Dennis.

By a show of voter cards, the motion passed.

Yes 45 No 41

The Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot as amended.

Selectman Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of this Article. Selectman DeRocchi seconded.

Dwight Barney commented.

PETITION WARRANT ARTICLE

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to place the land currently owned by the Town of Lee and known as Noble Farm, Tax Map 25-03-0000, a single parcel consisting of approximately 91.35 acres on North River Road, into a conservation easement and authorize the expenditure of up to fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for transaction costs to be withdrawn from the Land Use Tax Change Fund. (The Selectmen do not recommend this appropriation by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

Joe Lombardo moved Article 4. Suzanne DeRocchi seconded.

Joe Lombardo moved to amend the Article as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to authorize the Selectmen to place the land currently owned by the Town of Lee and known as Noble Farm, Tax Map 25-03-0000, a single parcel consisting of approximately 91.35 acres on North River Road, into a conservation easement and authorize the expenditure of up to fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for transaction costs to be withdrawn from the Land Use Tax Change Fund.

The motion was seconded.

Discussion ensued with comments from Pat Roop, Chairman John LaCourse, Shirley Walker, Bill Humm, and Leslie Martin.

William Henze moved the question. The Moderator declined to move the question as there were more active questions and discussion for the Article.

More comments were made by Paul Gasowski, Chairman John LaCourse, Bill Humm, David Cedarholm, Laurel Cox, Frank Reinhold, Pat Roop, Wendy Fogg, Leslie Cook, Bill Henze, Mary Cobb, Alan Dennis, Kristin Forselius, and George Walker.

Moderator announced that she would entertain William Henze's motion to move the question. John Puffer motioned to move the question. Carla Corey seconded.

By a show of voter cards, the amendment passed.

John LaCourse moved to amend the Article as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate zero thousand dollars (\$0) to authorize the Selectmen to place the land currently owned by the Town of Lee and known as Noble Farm, Tax Map 25-03-0000, a single parcel consisting of approximately 91.35 acres on North River Road, into a conservation easement and authorize the expenditure of up to zero dollars (\$0) for transaction costs to be withdrawn from the Land Use Tax Change Fund.

Carla Corey seconded.

Discussion ensued with comments from Richard Donovan, Bill Humm, Leslie Martin, Alan Dennis, George Walker, David Cedarholm, Dwight Barney, Jim Griswold, and Pat Roop.

By a show of voter cards, the amendment was defeated.

Yes 32 No 47

Dave Cedarholm made a motion to amend the Article to insert after the word easement "for an appropriate low impact use to include but not limited to agricultural or energy production."

Moderator Neill disallowed the amendment as it was changing the intent of the Article.

The Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article as amended on the ballot.

Selectmen Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of the Article. Selectman DeRocchi seconded.

By a show of voter cards the motion passed.

PETITION WARRANT ARTICLE

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following: Shall we rescind the provisions of RSA 40:13 (known as SB 2), as adopted by the Town of Lee on March 8, 2011, so that the official ballot will no longer be used for voting on all questions, but only for the election of officers and certain other questions for which the official ballot is required by state law?" (The Selectmen recommend this Article by a vote of 3-0) 3/5 Majority vote required.

Jim Griswold moved Article 5. Frank DeRocchi seconded.

Discussion ensued with comments from Kristin Forselius, Chuck Cox, Bill Henze, Leslie Martin, Ann Wright, and Paul Gasowski.

Karen Long moved the question. Caren Rossi seconded.

David Cedarholm made a comment.

There being no further discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot.

PETITION WARRANT ARTICLE

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to create a revolving fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h, for the purpose of providing cable access for public, educational, or governmental use on the Lee Public Access Television. All revenues received by the town from Comcast (less administrative fees) will be deposited into the fund and shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year and shall not be considered part of the town's general surplus. The town treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon order of the Board of Selectmen and no further approval of the town meeting shall be required. Such funds may be expended only for the purpose of hiring a sub-contractor responsible for the creation of content and administration (including purchase and maintenance of equipment) of Lee Public Access Television (Channel 13). (The Selectman do not recommend this Article by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

Jim Griswold moved Article 6, Geoffrey Carlton seconded.

Jim Griswold moved to amend the Article to read:

To see if the town will vote to create a revolving fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h, for the purpose of providing cable access for public, educational, or governmental use on the Lee Public Access Television. All revenues received by the town from Comcast <u>Franchise Fee</u> (less administrative fees) will be deposited into the fund and shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year and shall not be considered part of the town's general surplus. The town treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund and shall pay out the same only upon order of the Board of Selectmen and no further approval of the town meeting shall be required. Such funds may be expended only for the purpose of hiring a sub-contractor responsible for the creation of content and administration (including purchase and maintenance of equipment) of Lee Public Access Television (Channel 13).

Seconded by Geoffrey Carleton.

Discussion ensued with comments from Geoff Carlton, John LaCourse, Dwight Barney, Ann Wright, Paul Gasowski.

By a show of voter cards the motion passed.

There being no further discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot as amended.

Selectmen Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of the Article. Selectman DeRocchi seconded.

By a show of voter cards the motion passed.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 21A of the Racetrack Ordinance to add the following language: Sound levels resulting from any activities at the racetrack operation shall not exceed the established level using the A scale (dBA) and Fast Response setting. Sound levels shall be measured at any racetrack property line. Measurements shall be taken using a properly calibrated sound meter which is mounted 36 inches above the ground on a tripod and pointed directly towards the racing track surface. Any sound measurement that exceeds the established level, regardless of the duration, shall be a violation. (The Selectmen recommend this change by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

Andy Lelio moved Article 7. John LaCourse seconded.

Andy Lelio gave a power point presentation. After which discussion ensued. Comments were made by Richard Donovan, Tom, Loureiro, Kristen Forselius, John LaCourse, William Shaheen (attorney for the racetrack), Dwight Barney, David Cedarholm, Linda MacKay, and Ann Wright.

There being no further discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot.

Selectmen Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of the Article. Selectman DeRocchi seconded.

By a show of voter cards the motion passed.

Chairman LaCourse presented the Boston Post Cane to Eleanor Plumer.

ARTICLE 8. Shall the Town of Lee raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant Articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$3,453,593.00. Should this Article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$3,567,768.00, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Board of Selectmen or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (The Selectman recommend this Article by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

Frank DeRocchi moved Article 8. John LaCourse seconded.

Geoff Carleton moved to increase the line item Oyster River Youth Association from \$22,600 to \$26,500. John Puffer seconded.

Discussion ensued with comments from Karen Long, Frank DeRocchi, Todd Allen, and Dawn Genes.

By a show of voter cards, motion to amend passes.

There being no discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot as amended.

Selectmen Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of the Article. Caren Rossi seconded.

By a show of voter cards the motion passed.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to deposit into the Lee Library/Community Center Capital Reserve Fund. (The Selectmen recommend this appropriation by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) to deposit into the Highway Department Road and Bridge Improvement Plan Capital Reserve Fund. (The Selectmen recommend this appropriation by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

Peter Hoyt moved Article 10. Seconded by John LaCourse.

There being no discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot.

Selectmen Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of the Article. Caren Rossi seconded.

By a show of voter cards the motion passed.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to deposit into the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (The Selectmen recommend this appropriation by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be deposited into the Transfer Station Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (The Selectmen recommend this appropriation by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

Roger Rice moved Article 16. Jim Griswold seconded.

There being no discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot.

Selectmen Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of the Article. Frank DeRocchi seconded.

(The Selectmen recommend this appropriation by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

There being no further discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot.

Selectmen Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of the Article. Frank DeRocchi seconded.

By a show of voter cards the motion passed.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purchase of seven (7) Tasers with holsters and cartridges for the Police Department (The Selectman recommend this appropriation by a vote of 3-0) Majority vote required.

Jim Griswold moved Article 21. John LaCourse seconded.

Richard Donovan commented.

There being no further discussion, the Moderator requested the Town Clerk to place the Article on the ballot.

Selectmen Griswold moved to restrict reconsideration of the Article. Frank DeRocchi seconded.

By a show of voter cards the motion passed.

ARTICLE 22. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

John LaCourse, Dwight Barney and Frank DeRocchi made comments.

There being no other business, Phillip Stetson moved to adjourn. Jim Griswold seconded.

By a show of voter cards, the motion passed. The meeting adjourned at 2:10 pm.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Lee Lee, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lee as of and for the year ended June 30, 2012, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town of Lee's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions of these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and the significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

As discussed in Note 16 to the financial statements, management has not recorded the long-term costs of retirement health care and obligations for other postemployment benefits in governmental activities. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that those costs be recorded, which would increase the liabilities and expenses of the governmental activities. The amount by which this departure would affect the liabilities, net assets, and expenses of the governmental activities is not reasonably determinable.

In our opinion, because of the effects of the matters discussed in the preceding paragraph, the government-wide financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of the governmental activities of the Town of Lee as of June 30, 2012, or the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended.

In addition, in our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the major fund and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lee as of June 30, 2012, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended and the respective budgetary comparison for the general fund in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The Town of Lee has not presented a Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have determined is necessary to supplement, although not required to be part of, the basic financial statements.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Lee's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial schedules are presented for the purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. They are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the financial schedules themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

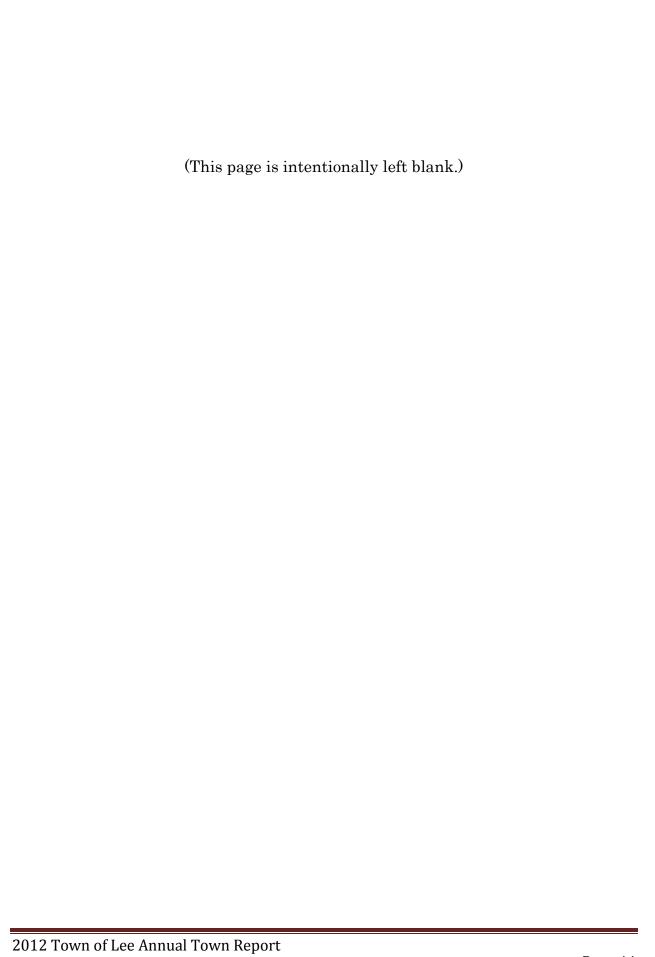

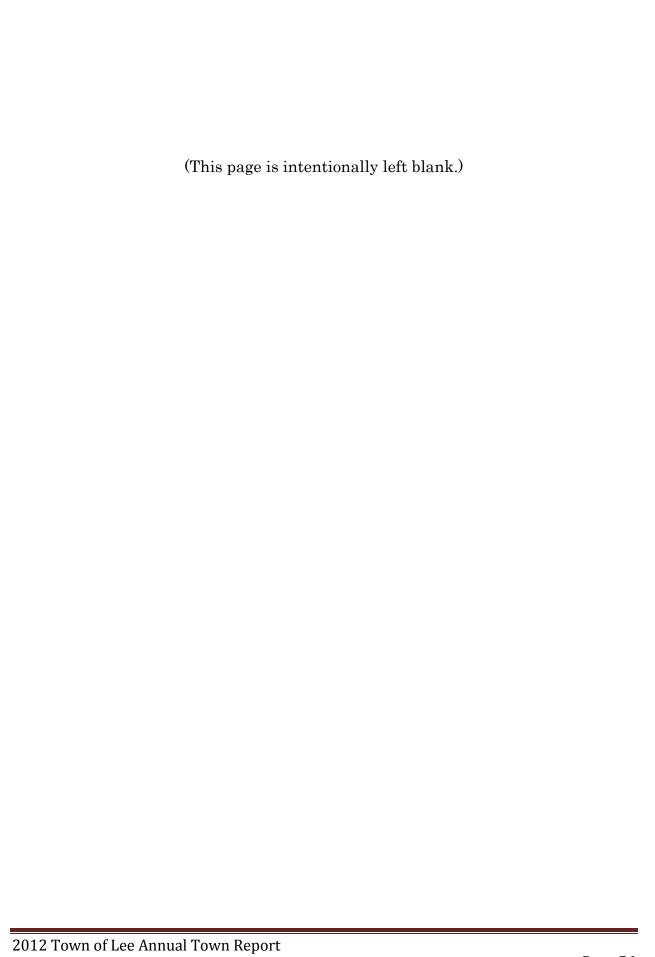

Pursuant to New Hampshire RSA <u>674:3</u> **673:6** Local Land Use Boards, the Zoning Board of Adjustment shall consist of five (5) members and <u>three (3)</u> **five (5)** alternates appointed by the Board of Selectmen to serve for three (3) year terms.

ARTICLE 3. PETITION

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 17 of the Racetrack Ordinance to add the following language: 17. D – Race car education, as currently allowed by the Racetrack Ordinance, shall be defined to mean a Race Car Driving School and shall operate not more than four times each month from April through October. The Driving School will not operate on weekends. The Driving School will be operated by a fully-licensed and insured company, using NASCAR-like stock cars. No more than four vehicles will be allowed on the track at any one time and the hours of track operation shall be within 12:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. All requirements under Section 21A and 21B of this Ordinance shall apply to the operations of the Driving School. The Racing School operations shall not be considered an event, as defined by Section 1 of the Racetrack Ordinance. Majority vote required.

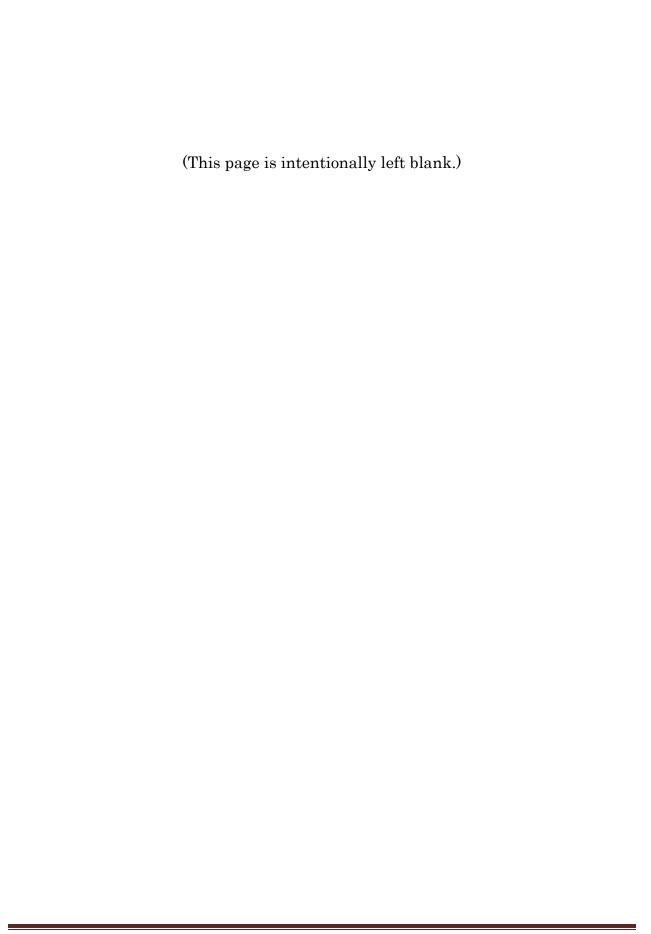

ASSESSING DEPARTMENT 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

The firm of Municipal Resources, Inc. continues to handle the assessing functions for the Town of Lee. The three primary members of the staff working in Town are Scott Marsh, Jerry Quintal and Joseph Lessard. Additional staff members Richard Dorsett and Michael Pelletier provide assistance. It is requested that if any of the appraisers come to your property, you support the Town's efforts to keep assessments equitable and proper by answering their questions and allowing them to inspect and measure your property.

Municipal Resources personnel are available to meet with taxpayers and if an appointment is desired, Dawn Hayes in the Assessing Office can schedule one for you.

The roughly \$3,500,000 increase in the 2012 taxable assessed valuation was a result of new and continuing construction which has remained at a relatively slow overall pace with roughly 65 new building permits currently needing to be reviewed in the upcoming year in addition to reviewing those properties which were not complete at the time they were last viewed. The Town will also continue the process of physically reviewing the various assessing data on file for 25% of the properties in Town.

The Department of Revenue Administration review of sales indicated that the Town's assessment ratio for the 2011-tax year was 102.4%. The DRA ratio for the 2012-tax year is 105%.

COMMUNITY PLANNING COORDINATOR 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

As more of our farm and forest land is protected, there is an evolving need to work toward helping Lee become a balanced community that can encourage a healthy and affordable life for all its citizens. The regional movement toward more local businesses, food growing and purchasing, energy production and efficiency, maintenance of a working landscape, and more community-based recreation and involvement fits well into the building of a vital and strong town.

The Community Planning Coordinator works with the Selectmen; Planning, Zoning, and Code Enforcement; the Conservation Commission, the Energy Committee, the Heritage Commission, and Agricultural Commission. The Coordinator also includes investigations into and writing of grants for town planning and development.

Some specific projects have included a \$40,000 federal grant for a comprehensive town energy plan; publishing the Lee Conservation and Agriculture News newsletters; holding the Button Up Lee workshop to weatherize the core town buildings; and displays at the Lee Fair and other town gatherings. Some of Lee's historical buildings have been placed on the NH State Register of Historic Places, the latest being the Glidden House at Wadleigh Falls Island Farm. Future applications include the Town Hall and Library. In cooperation with the Conservation Commission some surplus town owned lands are being reviewed in order to either make wise use of them or to sell them.

The Coordinator represents Lee at various statewide planning, agricultural, historical, and conservation meetings. Such as, the Technical Advisory Committee for the Strafford Metropolitan Planning Organization and the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy program at the Strafford Regional Planning Commission. Recent discussions include: new designs for the Lee Traffic Circle, a new Park and Ride site, and bus service expansion possibilities.

Strafford Regional Planning Commission has compiled a build-out analysis for the land of the town, given the restrictions of wetlands, ledge, conservation restrictions, and zoning and subdivision regulations; have provided a variety of maps which has helped in land planning activities.

Future directions for Lee may involve a community center/library; a senior citizen center; a town energy plan; safer bikeways; safer walking routes to school; an interconnecting trail system; more cottage/light industries, and professional offices throughout the town.

FIRE AND RESCUE DEPARTMENT 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

The Lee Fire and Rescue Department responded to 480 calls for assistance during this reporting period, a 10% increase over last year's call volume. Medical Aid continues to remain the highest in terms of overall call volume percentage, comprising over 36% of the responses. This year there were a number of structure fires; the department responded to four building fire calls.

As a paid/call department with only two full time employees, the department relies heavily on volunteer response. There has been a sharp decline in the number of residents willing to commit their time to emergency assistance response. If this trend continues it is likely the department will move towards adding more full time emergency response personnel.

Those who dedicate themselves to assisting the residents of Lee regularly participate in training activities. By remaining current in the latest techniques they remain well equipped to mitigate the complex issues facing today's emergency responders. Some of this training includes the use of special rescue tools to assist in the extrication of victims of motor vehicle crashes, hazardous materials response and mitigation; search and rescue procedures; ongoing emergency medical training. This ensures each member of the department has the knowledge necessary to assist those in need, and the skills to assist safely and effectively.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

The Lee Highway Department is responsible for maintaining 67 roads, which totals 37.40 miles that include 107 intersections, 28 turnarounds, town parking lots and numerous dry hydrants / pull-off areas. In addition, the Highway Department takes care of all of the mowing and grounds care of the cemeteries, parks, and Town buildings. The Highway Department also performed nine burials at the cemetery during the reporting period.

The winter of 2011-2012 started with a bang on October 29th with 8 inches of heavy wet snow and a lot of downed oak trees and limbs. The rest of the winter was relatively mild and quiet. The Department plowed and/or treated approximately 19 winter storm events with 36 inches of snow recorded. The light winter allowed time to do a lot of repairs and maintenance on the equipment, with considerable time spent on tightening up the '86 Cat grader and getting it painted.

During the reporting period 11 roads (4.94 miles) were crack sealed. Gile Road, Lee Hill Road, and Pinkham Road Ext. were shimmed with hot top also. Paving occurred just after the close of the fiscal year and will be reported in next year's report.

Two culverts on Plummer Lane and Demeritt Avenue were replaced and several miles of road were ditched, including all of the gravel roads on the South end of town.

The majority of the construction of the replacement of the High Road Bridge took place during the reporting period.

The Highway Department work at Little River Park was less than usual. The big projects were: finishing the basketball court area and screening hundreds of yards of loam.

Some other projects included brush clean-up on Loop Road, work at Noble Farm, building a portable trailer for the generator, and assisting at the Transfer Station.

There was no equipment purchased during the period.

We would like to thank the Townspeople, Budget Committee, and Board of Selectmen, for their continued support of the Highway Department.

The library strives to be the center of the community, serving all ages and interests. In addition to books, card-holders may borrow many different items. The Nook and the Kindle are loaded with titles and ready for people to take home and read as an alternative to print. Our growing audio collection is in heavy demand, as is the NH Downloadable books for your reading devices. Recently added this year are the Advantage e-Titles, exclusively for Lee card holders. Movie lovers are borrowing the new DVD releases off the shelves faster than we can put them on. Over 2,900 adults and children attended 250 classes, workshops, book discussions and children's events this year. Over ninety people came to listen to the story of Lee resident, Harold Ward, as he recounted his experience during the attack on Pearl Harbor. Townsfolk were treated to a night with Mrs. Lincoln, in full character and costume through the combined efforts of the Lee Public Library and the Historical Society. This Chautauqua performer had all of us convinced she really was Mrs. Lincoln. Another favorite presentation was given by Dr. Michelle Posage, and she explained the remarkable behavior of dogs and cats.

Children's Services saw an increase in signups for the summer reading program "Dream Big." The bat and owl presentation drew a record number of attendees and provided a quality family destination right here in Lee. Area daycares and schools were visited to promote reading and the library throughout the year. The library offered a number of fun learning and entertaining opportunities all year.

The dedication and support of the trustees and staff are valued. The library is grateful for the enthusiastic volunteers,

The Lee Energy Committee committed to weatherproofing the library. They sealed up drafty areas and covered windows with clear plastic, helping to keep the library warm all winter.

POLICE DEPARTMENT 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

The Lee Police Department successfully completed the Re-Recognition Program by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). As you may remember, the Lee Police Department was Recognized through CALEA in 2008. Every three years, the agency is required to be audited for compliance. In November of 2011, the Lee Police Department received CALEA Recognition once again.

As you can see from the statistical data listed below, the Police Department's activity level has stayed essentially the same; what is not readily apparent is the difference in the type of calls. While the number of calls for Assault, Driving While Intoxicated, Bad Check, Animal Complaint, and Paperwork Service has decreased, reports of Theft, Arson, Criminal Trespass, Littering, Suspicious Activity, Disabled and Abandoned Vehicles, Alarms, Wires Down and Medical Aid Calls have increased substantially. Worthy of mention is the substantial decrease in fatalities. In Fiscal Year 2011-2012, there were NO Fatal Motor Vehicle Accidents; the previous Fiscal Year, the Police Department investigated two (2) Fatal Motor Vehicle Accidents.

WELFARE DEPARTMENT 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

The Welfare Department provides temporary emergency assistance to individuals and families who lack adequate resources to meet their basic needs, as required by New Hampshire State Law RSA: 165. Eligibility is based on a need and determined each time a formal request for assistance is made through the application process. The Town can consider providing assistance to meet basic living needs of eligible residents in compliance with RSA: 165 and the Town of Lee Welfare Guidelines. All business is conducted in a professional, respectful, and fiscally responsible manner. Eligibility decisions are based on fair and equal application of the law and guidelines while:

- Maintaining Strict Confidentiality
- Providing Advocacy
- Maintaining Dignity
- Encouraging Self-Sufficiency

Assistance is provided through vouchers given directly to vendors for basic emergency needs such as food, fuel for heat, utilities, shelter expenses, and other necessities. Whenever possible, referrals to other resources, such as State and Federal programs, food pantries, etc., are made before local tax dollars are utilized.

If you feel that you are in need and have exhausted all other means of meeting your essential needs, i.e. if you have applied for any and all programs that could assist you (Fuel Assistance, Electric Discount Program, Food Stamps, TANF, Medicaid, Social Security benefits, subsidized housing, etc.), and you are still in need of financial assistance, complete the application for welfare assistance and collect all the documentation required-including proof of where any income has been spent (receipts, bills, etc.), as well as a copy of your tax return and your lease. This documentation is necessary in order to determine eligibility.

AGRICULTURAL COMMISSION 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

The Agricultural Commission had an active year. We regretfully accepted Wendy Fogg's letter of resignation, while Dwight Barney and Paul Gasowski agreed to another term on the Commission.

Old Home Day/Lee Country Fair: The year was full of activities for both the Old Home Day event and the Lee Country Fair in September, 2011. The Agricultural Commission accepted the responsibility of putting on a pig roast/chicken barbecue for Old Home Day, with many volunteers assisting in all the preparations. We also sponsored the Dessert Contest for Old Home Day. For the Lee Country Fair, we sponsored the Pickle, Pie, Relish, Sweetbread Contest.

Lee Farmers Market: The market was held every Thursday throughout the summer and proved to be successful. A total of 13 vendors participated with addition of crafts and baked goods. New signs were placed at prominent road junctions. This seemed to have increased customer volume as many new faces were seen at the market. We appreciate the continued support of the townspeople who visit the market each week.

Backyard Farming Initiative: The Backyard Farming Initiative is a joint venture with the Lee Library. There were various programs throughout the year, including a blacksmith demonstration, pig butchering and smoking hams, as well as canning and pickling instructions. The coming years' focus will be on "You Are What You Eat" panel discussions. The panel will consist of a nutritionist, chef, farmer, practitioner.

Noble Farm: We worked with the Planning Board on the re-zoning of the Noble Farm area. It was changed to a light commercial zone with some agriculture allowed. Many possibilities for this property have been discussed throughout the year.

Brochure/Directory: This year, we will be finalizing a brochure. It will include a map of Lee with farm sites, as well as a space for farm business cards.

Seacoast Local: David Boynton of Seacoast Local attended one of our meetings to discuss the focus of Seacoast Local and possible activities in Lee.

Sustainability: Paul Gasowski, worked extensively on sustainability within the School District (buying food locally, energy audits, etc.). Members worked on a proposal for agriculturally-related activities (high tunnels, community gardens, shared-use kitchen) within the town.

UNH: Members of the commission actively supported various agriculturally related programs at the university: supporting the continuation of the Diagnostic Lab and attending discussions of the UNH Master Plan which originally would have done away with much of the agriculture on Route 4.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

Major Activities of Lee Conservation Commission:

Protection of Open Space- The Commission continues to work with Laurel Cox, Community Planning Coordinator, to expand the area of protected open space within the Town and to seek to preserve the agricultural heritage of Lee through conservation easements. In this past year, without any cost to the Town, 15 acres of land have been preserved for agriculture uses in perpetuity.

Oversight of the Town's Conservation Easements- The Commission is charged with the responsibility of overseeing all conservation easements within the Town. Under the guidance of Laura Gund, who has assumed responsibility for the organization and reporting of this activity, members of the Commission conducted and filed reports on 35 monitoring site visits.

Advice to Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment- In accordance with its statutory responsibilities, the Commission serves as advisor to the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment on matters relating to the protection of wetlands and other items of environmental concern. Antoinette Hartgerink has assumed primary responsibility for organizing and reporting this activity. During the period covered by this report the Commission conducted and reported on 5 such site visits.

Educational and Outreach Activities- The Commission provided information relating to conservation easements and led nature walks in Little River Park during Lee Old Home Day. Catherine Fisher conducted an "early winter nature walk" and two "Spring Frog Walks" in the Town Forest. Also, the Commission sponsors, and members contribute articles to, the Lee Conservation and Agricultural Newsletter.

Stewardship Activities- The Commission held public informational meetings and conducted field support for activities on Town-owned land. Such activities include the New England Cottontail Habitat Restoration Project at Lee Five Corners Reserve and the development of the Joe Ford Wildlife Sanctuary. The Commission also conducted a "clean-up" of the Lee Bog.

Campership- Each year the Commission supports the attendance of a student from Lee to the Barry 4H Camp. This year's campership was awarded to Spencer Haas. Any resident interested in applying for the 2013 campership should contact the Commission.

Thanks for Exemplary Citizenship- The Commission wishes to thank Eagle Scout Tony Sergi for planning and, with his Boy Scout colleagues, completing a nature trail restoration project in the Town Forest and to thank Girl Scouts Susanna Serrano and Felicia Keegan (and their parents) for acquiring materials and completing an excellent restoration of the observation platform at the Lee Bog at no cost to the Town.

HERITAGE COMMISSION 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

Fiscal year 2012 was a busy one for the Heritage Commission. We were pleased to have visitors from Michigan, who were doing some local research, at one of our meetings in July. We welcomed Denis Hambucken as a new member of the Commission. Some of our activities included:

Preservation Easements: As we do each year, we monitored the two existing preservation easements: Flag Hill Winery and the Randall Farm. We also supported an Historic Preservation and Conservation Easement on the Wadleigh's Falls Island Farm.

5 Mast Road: There was a Special Town Meeting held this year to decide on purchasing this property. The Commission was interested in the property, located directly adjacent to the Town Hall. However, this did not pass at the Town Meeting.

Heritage Signs: Thanks to Preston Samuel who researched information and sites for the Heritage Trail throughout Town, we are well along in that project. Eight sites have been selected and signs will be up soon at various historic sites in town.

Lee History: We were fortunate this year to publish Donna Eisenhard's "History of the Lee Grange." Other segments of the Town's history will be available soon.

Lee Country Fair and Lee Old Home Day: The Commission participated in the annual September fair, having the Hobo Shed open to display old farm equipment and signs. We sponsored the Tractor Parade during Old Home Day, as well.

Burleigh-DeMeritt House: We presented an update on the house to the Selectmen, who offered their support. UNH is working on two other old homes in Durham and Madbury, however, the Burleigh-DeMeritt had not been discussed recently. We plan to meet with the new Dean of College of Life Sciences and Agriculture.

Inventory: The Commission has been compiling an inventory of the old Town records before they are placed in the vault.

250th Celebration for Lee: The Commission met with the Selectmen to discuss the planning for the 250th Celebration in 2016.

E911 Ordinance: The town is in the process of renumbering and renaming several roads in town to comply with E911. We have been asked to help with the naming of various roads and have made suggestions.

World War II program: Commission Member Denis Hambucken put together an excellent program on Pearl Harbor, with Harold Ward, a Veteran of WWII.

Events

The Annual Fishing Derby was also blessed with a sunny day but not with hungry fish! Special thanks to Michelle and Randy Stevens for hosting the event at their farm. Thanks to Cynthia McClain for organizing the event and AFP for fish cleaning services.

Little River Fest of September, 2011 included an "Old Home Day" tractor parade, live music, nature walks and kids games as part of the fun, followed by a Harvest Supper prepared by the Agricultural Commission. The meal was fantastic and enjoyed by over two hundred people.

Little River Park Developments

Banners sold at the Babe Ruth field at Little River Park brought in enough revenue to pay for the purchase of the outfield fence and the backstop. An ice skating rink was available for the winter thanks to Dennis Gelsomini and the Fire Department. A skating party was held in January with music, hot chocolate and a bonfire with the assistance from the Fire Department. The rink can be stored away and reused each winter. The picnic tables were sanded and stained as a community service project by the AFP fraternity.

Town Field

The Town Field dugouts were sided by the Policeman's Association and received a coat of paint by Oyster River Youth Association parent volunteers.

CEMETERY TRUSTEES 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

The Cemetery Trustees have been elected to oversee and maintain the public and non-public cemeteries.

One of the priorities during Fiscal Year 2012 was to update the Cemetery Rules and Regulations, last adopted October 13, 2011. If you own a plot in any of the Town cemeteries, reading the Rules and Regulations for the latest information is recommended. These new rules can be found on the Town of Lee website under Cemetery Trustees, Additional Links.

Eleven (11) plots were sold in FY 2012, a marked decrease from the 38 sold in 2011. Funds received from sale of a plot are deposited into a trust held by the Trustee of the Trust Funds. Interest income from the Trust is used to reimburse the Town for care of the cemeteries. FY 2012 interest was \$5,756.72. Although there are over 77 identified burial grounds within the Town limits, only 19 cemeteries have trusts held for their maintenance. This maintenance continues to be a large responsibility of the Trustees. Additionally, mowing and minor maintenance are carried out by Cemetery Superintendent Randy Stevens and his crew.

Major renovation continued at Old Parish Cemetery located on the corner of Garrity and Mast Roads. Broken stones were repaired and several stones cleaned. One stone found along the fence was mounted back at its original spot. The entire perimeter fence was cleaned of brush and dead trees. Privet hedge was pruned and the bank along Mast Road was cleaned of debris, revealing the old steps. All bent or broken pipes were repaired or replaced and all fences were painted.

Other cemeteries receiving repairing and painting of fences were The Charles Jones Cemetery on Snell Road, The Lee Hill Cemetery across from the Town Hall, and The Fernald Cemetery on Kelsey Road. The Durgin Cemetery located on the Snelling property, Route 155, was evaluated and has been placed on the maintenance list for 2013.

Thank you to the VFW Post 10676 of Lee for placing the memorial flags on the veterans' graves and removing them for winter. Several new flag holders were purchased for veterans buried during the year.

Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant Program for Town-Wide Energy Plan and Co-Generation Feasibility Study: COMPLETED

The \$40,000 federal grant involved four sections:

- 1) Comprehensive Town Plan for Energy Conservation
- 2) Comprehensive Town Energy Policy
- 3) Energy Efficiency Audit and Recommendations for Municipal Buildings
- 4) Feasibility Study of Distributed Energy and District Heating System Linking Core Town Center Buildings

Jeffrey Taylor and Associates worked with the Planning Board on section #2 of the Comprehensive Town Energy Policy. They reviewed the relevant regulations and created an energy policy audit. They met with the Board of Selectmen, the Planning Board, the Energy Committee, and the community to review the energy policy documents that articulate the community's energy goals. They identified local energy conservation strategies, made recommendations, and incorporated them into a draft energy section suitable for inclusion in the Lee Master Plan. Based on priorities identified in the regulatory audit, the firm worked with the town to prioritize and draft amendments to the land use regulations for Planning Board consideration.

The Sustainable Development & Energy Systems Group, LLC worked with the committee on the other sections of the grant project, producing an Energy Handbook with energy conservation/generation recommendations for homes, as well as municipal recommendations. They finished the energy audits of the municipal buildings that we started last year under the Municipal Energy Assistance Program Grant, and did a feasibility study for a District Heating and Co-Generation System for the town center buildings, based at the Transfer Station.

The Lee Energy Plan – Results will be available on leenh.org, at the Town Hall, and the Library.

Button Up Lee Workshop - In early December of 2011, the Lee Energy Committee held an informational workshop for weatherization and tightening up of municipal buildings: the Town Hall, Annex, and Library. Participants learned practical energy conservation and winterization skills, at the same time the town buildings were being winterized.

The next tasks will be to implement the suggestions in the Lee Energy Plan and the Lee Energy Capital Improvements Plan.

LAMPREY RIVERS ADVISORY COMMITTEE 2012 ANNUAL REPORT

The entire 47-mile Lamprey River and five of its tributaries have been designated into the New Hampshire River Management and Protection Program. The fourteen towns in the watershed are now represented in the expanded Lamprey Rivers Advisory Committee (LRAC.) The National Parks Service Wild and Scenic River program also covers about half of the lower portion of the Lamprey River and has become a part of the larger LRAC program. Each town has up to four representatives on the LRAC; Lee is represented by Jere Beckman, Kitty Miller, Sharon Meeker, and Preston Samuel. The LRAC meets in public session on the fourth Thursday of every month. We are working on our main tasks which include creating an advisory management plan for the rivers and their ¼ mile corridors and advising the Department of Environmental Services on projects proposed for the area.

In addition, funding from the National Parks Service has enabled the LRAC to continue its work in the following areas in the four lower river towns:

Land Protection - An additional 34 acres and 1,212 feet of shoreline along the Lamprey River have been protected.

Outreach, Education, and Recreation-

- Participated in the Great Bay Initiative discussions
- Opened the public canoe launch on the Lamprey River
- Improved our website: www.Lampreyriver.org
- Presented a video festival in Durham

Small Grants Program -

- Updated the Lamprey River Curriculum and placed it on the website
- Created two new DVD's, "Connecting Lives on the Lamprey," and "Spring Into Vernal Pools," available at the library and on the website
- Funded a personalized septic system program for 15 landowners.
- Funded three projects (1) investigating possibilities for fish passage up river from Wiswall Dam; (2) planning historic interpretation of Folsom Dam in Epping; (3) planning trails and playground for Mary Blair Park in Epping

Wildlife & Ecology -

- Vernal pool project with Epping High School
- Worked with Town of Durham to construct and open a fish ladder at Wiswall
- Funded and presented a two year fish study

History & Archaeology - Created two panels with Durham for Wiswall Park kiosk

Museum:

On other days, volunteers have been working on the museum inventory and re-organizing a few of our collections on the first floor.

Educational Activities:

The Society presented well-attended cultural programs for the public in joint sponsorship with the Lee Public Library. Lee presenters were Denis Hambucken, Bill Payson, and Harold Ward. In September, third graders from Mast Way School made their annual visit to the museum, as did the Tiger Cub Scouts. A special event in April for the Boy Scouts focused on the history of the railroad through Lee.

Highlights:

During the winter, our Board of Directors and Officers spent many hours updating our bylaws. After many drafts, including a Mission Statement, the revision was approved by the membership at our annual meeting in April. The meeting, which was held at the Jeremiah Smith Grange, included a potluck supper and a presentation by Donna Eisenhard on the history of this Grange.

Goals:

For the museum: we are establishing a collection policy, finishing the inventory of the existing collection, and reorganizing exhibits on the second floor. For the community: we would like to present at least two Lee Living History events.

Public Notice

Pertaining to RSA 674:39-aa, Restoration of Involuntarily Merged Lots

Under Title LXIV: Planning and Zoning, Chapter 674, Local Land Use Planning and Regulatory Powers, RSA 674:39-aa became law and is effective July 24, 2011.

This is a public notice to inform landowners that if their parcels/lots were involuntarily merged together with other lot(s) prior to September 18, 2010 by the town either while owned by them or previous owned by others, the present owner may file a request with the town to restore such lot(s) to their premerger status. The request must be submitted in writing to the governing body prior to December 31, 2016. If any owner in the chain of title voluntarily merged his or her lots, then all subsequent owners shall be stopped from requesting restoration.
